The cover photo of an eagle in flight is beautiful. There is nothing more majestic than the sight of a mature eagle soaring through a cloudless sky. The Bible uses this picture to describe a mature Christian who has learned to live in the strength that the Lord supplies.

Isaiah 40:31

“But they that wait upon the LORD shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint.”

The words in this verse were carefully chosen by God to communicate a wonderful message.

Wait upon – long for, tarry with, bind to

Renew – come on anew, substitute or change for better

Weary – cause to become toilsome

When a Christian learns how to live out of the resources God gave him at salvation he is constantly supplied with new energy from God.

Lamentations 3:22, 23

“It is of the LORD’S mercies that we are not consumed, because His compassions fail not. They are new every morning: great is Thy faithfulness.”

These energies from God are real and should be the norm for the Christian. The key is to live in connection to Him Who is the source. When your relationship with God is intimate and vibrant, the **Bible says we can expect renewed strength or revival every day**. The excitement of living with Him doesn’t need to grow old and wearisome. Don’t be content with a duty filled life of religion. As you study these lessons, ask God to show you the reality of a passion filled relationship of renewal with God.

The photo below is of an eaglet sitting next to his parent in preparation for flight. Eaglets “are born with instincts that urge them to fly, to bite or to pounce,” but the skills to do so must be acquired. In a similar way a new Christian has an appetite for an intimate relationship with God, but not the acquired skills. This Bible study is designed to help you begin learning to live with God.



Eagle parents cannot tell juveniles how to hunt. They have to learn by watching the parents and by practicing. The process is an interesting one. Fledglings (eaglets with the feathers necessary for flight) are still fed in the nest for several weeks. During that time the eaglets learn to spread their wings, and even allow the wind to pick them up, but often must be coaxed from the nest by hunger. The parent birds will stop feeding the fledgling, but be prepared to do so immediately upon landing from his first flight. Eagles build their nests in the heights of trees and cliffs. “Approximately 40% of young eagles do not survive their first flight,” and “[o]nly about 50% of eaglets hatched survive the first year.” This is due to the trial and error method of developing the basic skills of flying and hunting.

God made some unusual promises to the infant nation of Israel that also apply to growing Christians.

Exodus 19:4

“You have seen what I did unto the Egyptians, and how I bare you on eagles’ wings, and brought you unto Myself.”

Deuteronomy 32:10-12a

“He found him [Israel] in a desert land, and in the waste howling wilderness; He led him about, He instructed him, He kept him as the apple of his eye. As an eagle stirs up her nest, flutters over her young, spreads abroad her wings, takes them, bears them on her wings: So the LORD alone did lead him”

God Himself wants to be your instructor. He wants the very learning process to be an intimate experience with Him. It is a dangerous journey. Many new Christians never reach maturity because of the pitfalls along the way, but you have an advantage over eaglets in that God is personally willing to carry you on His wings, and even to protect you under His wings as a mother eagle does her young.

Psalms 36:7

“How excellent is your loving kindness, O God! Therefore the children of men put their trust under the shadow of thy wings.”

Your success or failure is based on your willingness to stay close to Him. Apply yourself to the study of His word in this Bible study. Ask Him to teach you as you read. He is the living God and wants to have a real, vibrant relationship with you.

➤ **LEARN**

Understand what God is teaching you from the Bible and how it applies directly to you. Memorize the verse at the end of each lesson. One of the meanings of the word *disciple* is a *learner*. Be a good learner!

➤ **LOVE**

This Bible study is about learning to live with God. Your relationship with Him is born out of His love for you and grows as you learn to love Him in return. "We love Him, because He first loved us." (I John 4:19)

➤ **LIVE**

Obey what God's Word is telling you to do. This is the way to be happy and grow as a Christian. Christ said, "If you love Me, keep My commandments." (John 14:15).

MY NEW INHERITANCE

Understanding what I inherited when I received Christ

When you received Jesus Christ as your own personal Savior, you inherited a lot more than you probably realized at the time. The Bible teaches:

1. He **has** saved you from the **penalty** of sin, which is eternity in the Lake of Fire,
2. He currently **is** saving you from the **power** of sin, which until now has kept you from being able break away from sinful living or even wanting to, and
3. He **will** save you from the very **presence** of sin by giving you an eternal home in Heaven.

The first and the last of these gifts are automatic and were completely settled the moment you made your great transaction with God by trusting Jesus to save you. The gift of victory over the **power** of sin was also “bequeathed”* to you at that same moment, but you have to access it now by faith. You might say that it is in your spiritual “bank account,” but you must continually decide to “write the checks” against your account in order to have its full benefit.

* to leave to another by will

The story is told of a wounded veteran of the Civil War who was famous for talking about his friend “Mr. Lincoln” as he wandered from place to place begging because he could no longer work. When challenged by a stranger to prove that he really knew the beloved president, he reached into his wallet and pulled out a tattered piece of paper. He was immediately embarrassed and admitted, “I’m not much for reading, but I know that is Mr. Lincoln’s signature.” When the stranger read the tattered paper he discovered that it was a generous federal pension, personally signed by Mr. Lincoln. He was walking around as a beggar, though President Lincoln had met his every need. As a Christian there is no need for you to live spiritually bankrupt. Jesus has made the perfect provision for your vast spiritual inheritance. In this lesson we will look at these three aspects of your inheritance in Christ and how you can come into full possession of all that is rightfully yours in Christ Jesus.

YOUR POSITIONAL STANDING

The word “positional” implies that our standing was given to us rather than personally earned. The word “standing” indicates that this is where we stand in our relationship with God. The blood of Jesus **has saved** you from the **penalty of sin** (eternity apart from Him in Hell) and **has given** you a perfect standing with God through Christ’s credited righteousness.

Lesson 1: My New Inheritance

1. Will those who have chosen to depend on God for eternal life ever face condemnation? _____

John 5:24

Verily, Verily [Truly, truly], I [Jesus] say unto you, He that hears My word, and believes on Him that sent Me, has everlasting life, **and shall not come into condemnation;** but **is passed from death unto life.**

Why?

2. Write the promise of God found in the following verses:

Romans 4:5

But to him that works not, but believes on Him that justifies the ungodly, **his faith is counted for righteousness.**

II Corinthians 5:21

For God has made Jesus, who knew no sin, to be sin for us; that we might **be made the righteousness of God in Him.**

Based on this promise, when we take His offer, we take His righteous account and meet His holy standard.

That is the reality of the exchange He offered us! He suffered as a lying, coveting thief in your place and offers you the ability to have a full relationship with God, as your Father, accepted by Him because of Jesus’ holy, just nature.

3. Read the following passage about Abraham, an Old Testament saint.

Romans 4:21-25 And **being fully persuaded** that, what He had promised, **He was able** also to perform. And therefore it was imputed to him [credited to his account] for righteousness. Now it was not written for his sake alone, that it was imputed to him; But for us also, to whom it shall be imputed, **if we believe on Him** that raised up Jesus our Lord from the dead; Who **was delivered for our offenses, and was raised again for our justification.**

➤ How secure is your standing with God?

This perfect standing with God is real and very valuable to you. “Imputed” righteousness means that when God looks at you, He sees the perfect righteousness of Jesus instead of the sinful record you have earned through your actions. Your positional standing is the foundation for the practical success God provides to give you victory over sin.

YOUR PRACTICAL SUCCESS

The blood of Jesus **is saving** you from the power of sin and **is giving** you His grace to live apart from sinning. The power of sin is the domination of sin over your life. Grace is God’s supernatural enabling through His indwelling Spirit.

THE FUTILITY OF MY SELF

Understanding the inability of my flesh to please God

4. Note the true state of man’s nature without Christ.

Romans 3:10-12 As it is written, There is **none righteous**, no, not one:

There is **none that understands**, there is **none that seeks after God**. They are all gone out of the way, **they are together become unprofitable**; there is none that does good, no, not one.

In the New Testament the word "flesh" usually refers to the abilities of our human nature, not just the body in which we live. These "fleshy" abilities are often contrasted with the abilities we have when we are supernaturally enabled by God's Holy Spirit. "It is the Spirit that quickens [gives life]; the flesh profits nothing" (John 6:63a). This supernatural enabling is called "grace." Just as God **gave** us the ability to go to Heaven simply by choosing to depend on Him, He is also willing to **give** us the ability to overcome the futility of our flesh.

Understanding the promise of Christ's life in you

Appropriating the power of God for my life

8. God gives us two purposes for His grace.

Romans 5:1-2 Therefore being **justified by faith,** we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ: by Whom also we have **access by faith into this grace wherein we stand,** and rejoice in hope of the glory of God.

How do we access these?

The word “hope” means eager expectation. Romans 3:23 teaches that sin causes all of us to “come short of the glory of God,” but this verse tells us that we can expect to see the glory of God in our lives through faith.

- **THE CRISIS OF FAITH**

(Trusting God enough to surrender your life to Him)

9. An Old Testament sacrifice meant the death of an animal. What kind of a sacrifice is God asking from you today?

Romans 12:1 I beseech you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, that you present your bodies a **living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God**, which is your reasonable service.

Note the words “holy” and “acceptable unto God.” Only God is holy. The only way we will ever be holy is by **surrendering** completely to Him and **depending** on Him to live His holiness in us. Just as He gave us grace for eternal life at salvation, He now gives us grace for holy living. The word “acceptable” means well-pleasing. Hebrews 11:6 teaches us that “...without faith it is impossible to please Him...” God is willing to **give** you His power to live when you give to Him the right to rule as Lord in your life. Many people want to use God as a servant or a “genie” to manipulate and use for their own desires. That’s not the way it works. When we yield ourselves to **Him** to be used as **His** servant, **then** He is ready to enable us do what **He** desires. Are you willing to surrender your life to Him and live as His servant? This is crucial if you are to see His strength living in you.

- **THE CONTINUATION OF FAITH**

(Choosing to do this on a moment-by-moment basis)

10. How does He expect us to live once we have surrendered to Him?

Hebrews 10:38 Now the just shall **live by faith**: but if any man draw back, My soul shall have no pleasure in him.

Experiencing the realities of God’s grace in my life

11. Who lives in us now that we are saved?

1 Corinthians 6:19 What? Don’t you know that your body is the temple of the **Holy Spirit** which is in you, which you have of God,

and you are not your own?

In Ephesians 5:18 the Bible teaches that just as alcohol controls the entire person who is drunk, the Holy Spirit will control the entire person who is “filled” with Him. “And be not drunk with wine, wherein is excess; but be filled with the Spirit.”

Fulfilling the purpose of the Spirit-filled life - service for the King

2 Corinthians 9:8 And God is able to make all grace abound toward you; that you, always having all sufficiency in all things, **may abound to every good work.**

YOUR PERMANENT SANCTUARY

In a wildlife sanctuary, the animals are not exposed to the dangers to which the animals outside the sanctuary are exposed. When we get to Heaven, we will permanently be protected from the dangers of sin and its effects. The blood of Jesus **will save** you from the very presence of sin and **will give** you an eternal home with Him in Glory!

13. Where did Jesus say He was going? _____

John 14:1-3 Let not your heart be troubled: you believe in God, believe also in me. **In my Father’s house** are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. **I go to prepare a place for you.** And if **I go and prepare a place for you**, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there you may be also.

What did He say He was preparing for those who believe in Him?

14. Where does the believer go as soon as his body dies?

2 Corinthians 5:8 We are confident, I say, and willing rather to be absent from the body, and to be **present with the Lord**.

The Bible teaches us in 1 Corinthians 15:53-55 that God is going to give us new incorruptible bodies in Heaven. Revelation 21:3-4 teaches us that God Himself will wipe away all tears. He plans to do away with death, pain and sorrow, all of which have their origin in sin. Praise the Lord, friend, if you have placed your trust in Christ! Some day God will give you a new sinless body and put you in a place without sin with Him forever.

James 1:22-25 But **be you doers of the Word**, and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves. For if any be a hearer of the word, and not a doer, he is like unto a man beholding his natural face in a glass [mirror]: For he beholds himself, and goes his way, and straightway forgets what manner of man he was. But whoever looks into the perfect law of liberty [the Bible], and continues therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a **doer of the work**, this man shall be blessed in his deed.

In this lesson you have seen that God promises you His victory if you will simply surrender your life to Him in dependence, and look to Him for His continual grace to do His work. We will look more in depth at these issues in the weeks to come, but will you ask God to continue making you willing to have Him work in your life to this end?

Understanding the foundational nature of the Word of God

Before we continue our study of accessing God's victory for daily living, let's look at the role the Bible plays in this victory. The dominating desire of a newborn infant is for his mother's milk. It contains all the nourishment a baby needs for strength and growth. This is a great picture of what the Word of God is to a growing Christian. All that is needed for spiritual strength and growth in every area of life is found in the Bible. A healthy Christian hungers after and feeds regularly on the Word of God. A working knowledge of the Bible and submissive dependence on the Bible are absolutely necessary for spiritual life and growth. Study this lesson carefully. It will lead you to a healthy appreciation of the Bible and a vibrant approach to gaining its spiritual nourishment.

WHAT IS THE BIBLE?

The Bible is the complete, authoritative revelation of God's person and truth to mankind. It is all we need to know about Who God is, who we are and how we can have a right relationship with God.

1. What is God's Word? _____

John 17:17

Sanctify them through Your truth: **Your Word is truth.**

What does it do? _____

This verse is from the last recorded prayer of Jesus before His crucifixion. The word "sanctify" means to set apart for a special use. Jesus is asking God to use the Bible as the means by which His followers might be made holy for His service. When He declares the Bible as truth, He is declaring it as the absolute last word in any matter. The Bible is so complete that God promises great judgment upon the person who attacks it.

2. What are the two things God warns all men not to do to His Word?

Revelation 22:18-19 For I testify unto every man that hears the words of the prophecy of this Book, If any man shall **add unto these things**, God shall add unto him the plagues that are written in this Book: And if any man shall **take away from the words of the Book of this prophecy**, God shall take away his part out of the Book of Life, and out of the holy city, and from the things which are written in this Book.

It is important to remember that when a person receives God's gift of eternal life, he has "passed from death unto life" and will "not come into condemnation" (John 5:24). This passage in Revelation is not teaching that one can lose his eternal security, but it clearly shows God's attitude toward tampering with His Word. If a man purposely chooses to disregard a particular truth from the Bible, he is guilty before God. It is imperative for all of us to have a healthy respect for the absolute authority of God's Word.

3. What does the Bible say about God's credibility?

Titus 1:2 In hope of eternal life, which **God**, that **cannot lie**, promised before the world began.

There are going to be times when what you read in the Bible doesn't seem to be true, based on what you are experiencing. Our limited view must not be the final judge of truth. It is important at such times to remember that the Bible is the definer of truth. Learn to judge your circumstances in the light of the Bible and not judge the Bible in the light of your circumstances. Our emotions also deceive us at times and make us **feel** that the Word of God is not true. The great reformer Martin Luther wrote this poem to remind himself of the reliability of the Bible versus his own emotions.

*Feelings come and feelings go,
And feelings are deceiving,
My warrant is the Word of God
Naught else is worth believing.*

Setting up your experiences as your guide leads to living like a butterfly, flitting from experience to experience, never knowing where they will take you. It is better to use the Bible as your roadmap and follow its leadership. You will still end up having a lifetime of great experiences, but all the while you will be growing deeper and deeper in your relationship with God.

The Bible uses the word “inspiration” to describe how we got our Bible. Inspiration means “*God-breathed*.” Just as air is breathed out of living creatures, so the words of Scripture flowed directly out of the living God. Inspiration is the supernatural process by which God used men to write down without error the exact words God chose to communicate His truth to mankind.

The word “doctrine” means teachings. The Bible teaches us what is true. It points out our disobedience to the truth, helps us make necessary corrections and then shows us how to stay right.

John 20:31 But **these are written, that you might believe** that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing you might have life through His name.

Romans 10:17 So then **faith comes by hearing**, and hearing **by the Word of God**.

14. What is necessary to please God?

Hebrews 11:6a But without **faith** it is impossible to please Him:

Faith is not simply understanding something and agreeing that it is true. It is choosing to personally depend on that truth. It is only by genuinely believing the Bible that we can please the Lord. Jesus is clearly called “the Word” in two different places and is equated with “the Word” in many others.

15. What did Jesus call Himself, and what did He say men must do to experience His life in them?

John 6:51 I am **the living bread** which came down from Heaven: if any man **eat of this bread**, he shall live for ever: and the bread that I will give is My flesh, which I will give for the life of the world.

It is not enough to look at bread. You must eat it before it is beneficial. It is not enough for you to simply read the Bible or listen to others talk about it. You must choose to rely on it for yourself before you can experience its benefits. There is a sense in which you are partaking of Jesus when you choose to read and believe the Bible.

HOW TO STUDY THE BIBLE

16. How often should you study the Bible?

Joshua 1:8 This book of the law shall not depart out of your mouth; but **you shall meditate therein day and night**, that you may observe to do according to all that is written therein: for then you shall make your way prosperous, and then you shall have good success.

Write in your own words what it means to meditate.

Some might say that meditation is emptying your mind of everything and letting an inner voice speak to you. In this verse the thought is to purposely run past your mind the truth from God's Word. While it is true that God's Spirit leads us in this activity, it is necessary to realize that He does so using the words of Scripture. He expects our mind to actively pursue His truth, not passively.

17. Why should you memorize God's Word?

Psalms 119:9-11 Wherewithal shall a young **man cleanse his way**? By taking heed thereto according to Thy word. With my whole heart have I sought Thee: O let me not wander from Thy commandments. Thy word have I hid in my heart, **that I might not sin against Thee.**

18. What word picture is used to describe memorizing the Bible?

James 1:21 Wherefore lay apart all filthiness and superfluity [abundance] of naughtiness, and receive with meekness the **engrafted Word**, which is able to save your souls.

The picture of the engrafted Word is that of a grapevine or a fruit tree with a new branch grafted in. The new branch becomes an actual part of the living plant and allows the old plant to bear the good fruit of the engrafted branch. God wants us to literally graft His Word right into the very fabric of the way we think and, thus, begin to change the fruit we bear.

19. How does God want us to approach the Word of God?

I Peter 2:2-3 As newborn babes, **desire the sincere milk of the Word**, that you may grow thereby: If so be you have tasted that the Lord is gracious.

20. Can the Bible mean one thing to one person and something totally different to another? _____

Why? _____

II Peter 1:20,21 Knowing this first, that **no prophecy of the Scripture is of any private interpretation. For the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man:** but holy men of God spoke as they were moved by the Holy Spirit.

The Bible is not a human book from which we can take what we want and discard the rest. It is a divine book, and God promises divine (supernatural) abilities through the faith that it produces in its followers.

21. What does God promise to those who count on His promises?

II Peter 1:4 Whereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises: that by these **you might be partakers of the divine nature**, having escaped the corruption that is in the world through lust.

22. Who must we depend upon to help us understand the meaning of the Scripture?

1 Corinthians 2:12-13 Now we have received, not the spirit of the world, but **the Spirit** which is of God; that we might know the things that are freely given to us of God. Which things also we speak, not in the words which man's wisdom teaches, but which the **Holy Spirit** teaches; comparing spiritual things with spiritual.

Some have called this illumination. It is as if the words He wants us to understand and apply to our lives are illumined and sometimes seem to jump off the page at us. Each time you get alone with your Bible allows you an intimate moment alone with God. As you spend time with God in your Bible, you will be growing in your relationship with Him. Don't forget! God is not a concept to learn about. He is a person to get to know intimately!

APPLICATION

23. James 1:22-25 teaches that we must not just be a hearer of the Word but also a doer of the Word. Note the picture created here. What does God teach that you must do before you receive the blessing of the Word of God?

James 1:22-25 But be doers of the Word, and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves. For if any be a hearer of the Word, and not a doer, he is like unto a man beholding his natural face in a glass [mirror]: For he beholds himself, and goes his way, and straightway forgets what manner of man he was. But whoso ¹**looks into the perfect law of liberty**, and ²**continues therein**, he ³**being not a forgetful hearer**, ⁴**but a doer of the work**, this man shall be blessed in his deed.

In this lesson you have learned that the Bible is the foundation of your Christian life. It is through the Bible that God will continue speaking to you the rest of your life. No doubt, God wants you to make some decisions about your attitudes and

actions toward His Word. Would you, right now, bow your head and ask Him to lead your heart to those changes? Maybe He desires for you to carve out a time each day to read the Bible, or maybe He wants you to commit to memorize your Bible verses. It may be that He wants you to be hungrier for His Word or to see it as absolute and not relative truth. Perhaps God is burdening you to be in church regularly to hear His Word taught and applied to your daily living. Has God been tugging at your heart concerning any of these issues? Perhaps you should look back over the lesson and allow Him to remind you of anything else.

Understanding public identification with Christ & joining a Bible believing church

Congratulations on your decision to receive Christ's exchange! The decision itself is completely voluntary and private, but it is impossible to keep such a decision hidden. In fact, God has designed a public identification with Jesus that not only allows you to show others what He has done in your life, but also aligns you with others who have made the same decision. This public identification is baptism, and the ongoing alignment is church membership. The Bible teaches that when you became a Christian, you immediately became a child of God. You are now part of a family of believers. God is your Father, and all other Christians are your brothers and sisters in Christ. God's plan for each of His children is to have a home where they receive and give encouragement to live for Him. This lesson is about that public identification and how to choose, join and function within a church home for you and your family.

THE MEANING AND IMPORTANCE OF BAPTISM

The New Testament was originally written in Greek and was later translated into English. The word "baptize" is a transliteration of the Greek word "Bap-tid-zo." The translators created an English word from the Greek word rather than give its meaning, which is "to dip, to immerse, to place under, or to overwhelm." Baptism is a picture of being placed into the death, burial and resurrection of Christ. It is a testimony to others that you have been saved. Both baptism and faithful church attendance are imperative steps of obedience for the Christian.

- I. What do the following verses say is necessary in order to be saved? Does it include baptism?

Romans 10:13 For whoever shall **call upon the name of the Lord** shall be saved.

Ephesians 2:8-9 For **by grace** are you saved **through faith**; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: **Not of works**, lest any man should boast.

It is extremely important for believers to be baptized, but understand that it is a part of your walk with the Lord **after** you are saved.

2. Through what do we obtain forgiveness of sins?

Ephesians 1:7 In Whom we have redemption **through His blood**, the forgiveness of sins, **according** to the riches of **His grace**.

When Jesus was on earth, He left His disciples with instructions about what to do once He returned to Heaven. These instructions are recorded in each of the first five books of the New Testament. It has long been called *The Great Commission* because He is commissioning every believer to these tasks. It is the purpose for the Church, God's chosen body of believers, to do His work in this age. Matthew 28:18-20 gives the most detailed record of these instructions.

Matthew 28:18-20 And Jesus came and spoke unto them, saying, ¹“All power is given unto me in Heaven and in earth. ²**Go** therefore, and **teach all nations**. ³**baptizing them** in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: ⁴**Teaching them to observe [obey]** all things whatsoever I have commanded you: ⁵and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen.”

The Great Commission has five basic elements:

1. Everything that men do, including work in the church, must be for the glory of God.
- 2-4. The three basic purposes of the church.
5. God receives the glory when His children obey these instructions by depending on His power and presence.

3. List the three basic purposes of the church found in Matthew 28:18-20.

The words translated “Go therefore, and teach all nations” could be stated “Go to every people group in the world and make disciples or followers of Me by teaching them the way of salvation.” Lesson 12 deals fully with this concept. The next main purpose of the church is to gather these converts into a body of believers who have all been identified as His followers through public baptism. The third main purpose for the church is to train these believers to obey the teaching of Jesus.

As a new believer you have already participated in the first important step of God's plan for this age! You have become a disciple, or a follower of Jesus. Now His plan is for you to continue on in the next two steps.

4. According to Matthew 28:18-20, what is the next step you need to take?
-

If you answered, "to become a part of a church body by being baptized" you were right. If you have already been Scripturally baptized after your salvation, then your next step would be to join a Bible-preaching church. If you are currently a member of a Bible-preaching church, your next step is to become actively involved in helping fulfill the *Great Commission* in your church. The questions remain, "What is baptism, and what does it mean?"

Romans 6 deals with spiritual baptism and is a crucial passage when considering these questions. Spiritual baptism is being placed into the spiritual body of Jesus. Through Him we have already experienced the benefits of His death and resurrection. Physical baptism is a picture of spiritual baptism.

5. What do you show through this external picture of the internal event that has already taken place in your heart?

Romans 6:3-5 Know you not, that so many of us as were **baptized** [placed] **into Jesus Christ** were **baptized** [placed] **into His death**? Therefore we are **buried with Him by baptism** [immersion] **into death**: that like as Christ was **raised up from the dead** by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. For if we have been **planted together in the likeness of His death**, we shall be also **in the likeness of His resurrection**:

Baptism is being placed into the body of Christ through the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus. Which mode of baptism - sprinkling or immersion - would best show this picture in which one is placed under the water and then raised back out? Obviously, the picture is immersion.

6. Why did John choose this particular place to baptize?

John 3:23 And John also was baptizing in Aenon near to Salim, **because there was much water there**: and they came, and were baptized.

7. The book of Acts records the beginning of the church. In the following verses note who was baptized and what preceded their baptism.

➤ Acts 2:41 Then **they** that **gladly received His word** were **baptized**: and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls.

➤ Acts 8:12 But when **they believed Philip preaching** the things concerning the kingdom of God, and the name of Jesus Christ, they **were baptized**, both men and women.

➤ Acts 8:36-38 And as they went on their way, they came unto a certain water: and the eunuch said, See, here is water; what does hinder me to be baptized? And Philip said, **If you believe with all your heart**, you may. And he answered and said, I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God. And he commanded the chariot to stand still: and they went down both into the water, both Philip and the eunuch; and he **baptized him**.

➤ Acts 10:46-48 Then answered Peter, Can any man forbid water, that these should not be baptized, **which have received the Holy Spirit** as well as we? And he commanded them **to be baptized** in the name of the Lord.

(Remember, the Holy Spirit indwells only believers.)

➤ Acts 16:30-33 And brought them out, and said, Sirs, what must I do to be saved? And they said, **Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and you shall be saved**, and your house. And they spoke unto him the Word of the Lord, and to all that were in his house. And he took them the same hour of the night, and washed their stripes [wounds from being whipped]; and *was baptized*.

➤ Do you notice a pattern?

8. According to these Scriptures, how soon after salvation were people baptized?

Many were baptized the same day they were saved. The longest time between salvation and baptism recorded in the Bible is three days (the Apostle Paul – Acts 9:1-18). If you have been saved, there should be nothing keeping you from being baptized.

9. Have you been Scripturally baptized according to these Scriptures since you were saved?

10. If baptism is a command from the Lord, what would you call refusal to be baptized?

James 4:17 Therefore to him that knows to do good, and does it not, to him **it is sin**.

Baptism is gladly identifying with Jesus. One might liken it to wearing a wedding ring. When I got married, my wife gave me a simple gold wedding band. I wear it to identify myself as belonging to her. The vows we made before God and men joined us. The ring is simply a symbol that the marriage took place. I don't wear the ring to get married. I wear it to show that I am married. What if I put the ring on my 15-year-old son? What would it mean on his finger? NOTHING! He's

not married yet. In a similar way, baptism is a picture of our union with Christ at salvation. If a person were baptized before salvation, it is as meaningless as my son wearing my wedding ring. **Salvation must precede baptism for baptism to mean anything.** What if I took my ring off? Would I be unmarried? NO! The ring doesn't make me married. It only shows others that I am married. In a similar way, if a person doesn't get baptized, it doesn't make him unsaved. It only makes him disobedient. What if I were to take my ring off and lay it on the table in front of my wife and curtly inform her that I wasn't going to wear it anymore? Do you think it would hurt my relationship with her? YES! In a similar way, while not being baptized doesn't change your standing with God, it does damage your relationship with Him. God's perfect will for your life is that you show the world that you belong to Him by being baptized and becoming an active participant in a Bible-believing church family.

THE IMPORTANCE OF CHURCH MEMBERSHIP

Picture a log fire burning brightly in a cozy fireplace. Now imagine taking one of the logs out and setting it on the hearth. What do you think will happen? The log that was taken out will probably stop burning, start smoking and make a mess. If you take the same log and put it back in the fireplace where it belongs, it will once again burn brightly and warm the room. In a similar way, God has built the local church to help you stay on fire and be of use to the Lord. Christians who get out of church lose their zeal and make a mess of God's plan for their lives. Christians who stay in church as God intended are more likely to grow in their spiritual walk and usefulness to God.

Hebrews 10:21 teaches that Jesus is the ever-living leader of the church and His church family is called the house of God. The following passage lists some of the benefits and responsibilities of being a part of this.

Hebrews 10:22-25 ¹Let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled from an evil conscience, and our bodies washed with pure water. ²Let us hold fast the profession of our faith without wavering; (for he is faithful that promised;) And ³let us consider one another to provoke unto love and to good works: ⁴Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting [building up] one another: and so much the more, as you see the day approaching.

11. In your own words describe the benefits of a strong church family listed in the first two parts of this passage.

Actively participating in a local church promotes changing the way we view sin and promotes restoring a healthy conscience. It helps us clean up our lives to more accurately show Jesus to the world in which we live. It gives us the ability to become consistent in our Christian living by learning to live in dependence on the promises and the Promise Giver.

12. In your own words, describe a church member's responsibilities in the second two parts of Hebrews 10:22-25.

You know what it means to provoke someone to frustration. Consider a place where everyone provokes one another to love and good works. It is probable that not everyone in any church is living this way, but the emphasis is on our being that kind of person in *our* local church. The responsibility continues, teaching us that we need to faithfully attend church so we can build up one another. The closer we get to the Lord's return, the more important our participation in our local church family becomes.

13. How often do you think the Lord would have you attend church?

Most Bible-preaching churches have three or more services a week. The more you attend, the more opportunities you give yourself for spiritual growth and maturity. Not only does church help us grow in the Lord, the church is God's plan for reaching the world with the Gospel. Only through the local church can we be obedient to God's *Great Commission*, which is the purpose of the church. We must all join and participate in the programs of a Bible-preaching local church in order to fulfill this commission.

14. In the first church what immediately followed salvation and baptism?

Acts 2:41 Then they that gladly received His Word were baptized: and the same day there **were added unto them** about three thousand souls.

Church membership is available only to people who have been saved and baptized. In fact, the act of baptism placed these first believers into the church.

15. List the activities of the early church.

Acts 2:42 And they continued steadfastly in the apostles' **doctrine** and **fellowship**, and in **breaking of bread**, and in **prayers**.

Steadfast – to adhere or be glued to, to be devoted to, regularly

Doctrine – authoritative teaching

Fellowship – intimate joint participation in a common community

Breaking of bread – remembering the death and resurrection of the Lord

16. Of what dangers do you need to be careful when choosing a church?

Galatians 1:6-9 I marvel that you are so soon removed from Him that called you into the grace of Christ unto **another gospel**: which is not another; but there be some that trouble you, and **would pervert the gospel of Christ**. But though we, or an angel from Heaven, **preach any other gospel** unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let him be accursed. As we said before, so say I now again, If any man **preach any other gospel** unto you than that you have received, let him be accursed.

II Timothy 4:3-4 For the time will come when **they will not endure sound doctrine**; but after their own lusts [desires] shall they heap to themselves **teachers, having itching ears**; and they shall **turn away their ears from the truth**, and shall **be turned unto fables**.

17. What two offices of leadership were given to the local church?

1 Timothy 3:1, 8 This is a true saying, If a man desire the office of a **bishop** [pastor], he desires a good work.... Likewise must the **deacons** ...

The word “bishop” is one of three names given to the pastor in the Bible.

18. For what purpose is the evangelist and pastor/teacher given to the church?

Ephesians 4:11-12 And He gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; for **the perfecting [equipping] of the saints [believers]**, for [into] the work of the ministry, for the edifying [building up] of the body of Christ.

19. What should be your attitude toward the leadership of the local church?

1 Thessalonians 5:12-13 And we beseech [plead with] you, brethren, to **know them** which labor among you, and are over you in the Lord, and admonish you; and to **esteem [value] them very highly in love** for their work's sake. And be at peace among yourselves.

Hebrews 13:17 **Obey them** that have the rule over you, and **submit yourselves**: for they watch for your souls, as they that must give account, that they may do it with joy, and not with grief: for that is unprofitable for you.

APPLICATION

James 1:22-25 promises God's special blessing on those who take action on what His Word teaches.

If you are not willing to obey, write the reason you are procrastinating. Also write the consequences that would result from not obeying.

THE PURPOSE OF HIGHLANDS BAPTIST CHURCH

The purpose of Highlands Baptist Church is ¹to glorify God by ²compellingly and effectively evangelizing the lost; ³assimilating new people into our church family through discipleship, baptism, and continuing relationships; ⁴equipping each member to kingdom work in the church through teaching, preaching, caring, and God-honoring music; and accomplishing all of this by ⁵depending on the power of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ.

The purpose of Highlands Baptist Church is to glorify God by depending on Him to evangelize the lost, assimilate new people, and equip each member to kingdom work in the church.

Matthew 28:18-20 And Jesus came and spoke unto them, saying, All power is given unto me in Heaven and in earth. Go therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen.

- I. **Glorifying** – “For you are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God’s.” (I Corinthians 6:20)
 - A. Some form of the word “glory” is used 547 times in the Bible.
 1. Brilliant Light – **This is what He is.**
“And one [seraphim] cried unto another, and said, Holy, holy, holy, is the LORD of hosts: the whole earth is full of His glory.” (Isaiah 6:3)
 2. Give the right opinion of – **This is what we do.**
“I am the LORD: that is My name: and My glory will I not give to another.” (Isaiah 42:8)
 - B. Westminster Confession – The chief end and goal of man is to glorify God.
- II. **Evangelizing** – “Go therefore, and teach all nations”
 - A. The **Essentiality** of the Command – Going is a presupposed activity, but it is necessary in fruit-bearing.
“You have not chosen Me, but I have chosen you, and ordained you, that you should go and bring forth fruit, and [that] your fruit should remain: that whatsoever you shall ask of the Father in My name, He may give it you.” (John 15:16)
 - B. The **Activity** of the Command – Teach – to make a disciple
 - C. The **Extent** of the Command – All Nations (every creature)
 - D. The **Area** of the Command – “Where do we baptize? Where do we teach men to observe? This command is given to the church! This is how we are to assault the “Gates of Hell.” “...upon this rock I will build My church; and the **gates of Hell** shall not prevail against it.” (Matthew 16:18)

III. **Assimilating** – “Baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost”

- A. The **Event** of the Command – Baptism is the step of becoming a member in a local church.
- B. The **Process** of the Command – There are some other steps that are presupposed here.

1. **Discipleship**

- a. As much a crisis as salvation
- b. As much a work of grace/faith as salvation
- c. Not just teaching, but making a convert – a follower of Jesus

2. **Baptism**

- a. Brought into a fellowship – a working together for the demonstration of a purpose (Eph. 3:9)
- b. Brought into a body – a belonging to and building up of itself for God (Eph. 4:12-13)

3. **Continuing Relationships**

- a. This is necessary if new people are genuinely going to be a part of the body.
- b. This is more than friendliness when someone comes into our “store” to see if they want to buy something.
- c. This is buying into our common goal and committing themselves to it.
- d. This is choosing to “join the family.”
- e. This takes time, effort, **discipleship**.

If someone is already committed to our goal, than all it takes is a communicating of that goal. This can happen through preaching.

If someone is not already committed to our goal, this takes a work of grace and individual care.

- f. This takes carefulness – “Be diligent to know the state of your flocks, and look well to your herds.” (Proverbs 27:23)

Who have you befriended and welcomed into our family?

IV. **Equipping** – “Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you”

- A. The **Strength** of the Command – This is not just teaching – this is “teaching them to observe” – to obey.

Lesson 3: My Baptism & Church Membership

1. Again this is a work of grace that we cannot do without the power of God working through us.
 2. This is not just having Bible Studies in Sunday School, but it is getting people to come.
 3. This is not just telling people, but patiently loving them and encouraging them while they grow.
- B. The **Scope** of the Command – “All things”
1. This is Doctrine. – “Then they that gladly received His Word were baptized: and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls. And they continued steadfastly in the apostles’ doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayers.” (Acts 2:41-42)
 2. This is Lifestyle. – “But as He which has called you is holy, so be you holy in all manner of conversation [lifestyle].” (I Peter 1:15)
 3. This is Application. – “But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves.” (James 1:22)
- C. The **Source** and Goal of the Command – “I have commanded you”
1. This is the end of all that we do!
 2. “But let him that glories, glory in this, that he understands and knows **Me**, that I am the LORD which exercise **lovingkindness, judgment, and righteousness**, in the earth: **for in these things I delight**, saith the LORD.” (Jeremiah 9:24)
- V. **Implementing** – “All power is given unto Me in Heaven and in earth. ...and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen.”
- A. The **Precondition** of the Command – “All power is given unto Me in Heaven and in earth. Go therefore....”
1. The Type of Power – the power of authority (influence) and of right (privilege)
 2. The Demonstration of Power
 - a. His Fearless Preaching – “But woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for you shut up the kingdom of Heaven against men: for you neither go in yourselves, neither suffer [allow] you them that are entering to go in!” (Matthew 23:13)
 - b. His Fearless Purity – “And Jesus went into the temple of God, and cast out all them that sold and bought in the temple, and overthrew the tables of the moneychangers, and the seats of them that sold doves.” (Matthew 21:12)
 - c. His Fearless Death – “And when Jesus had cried with a loud voice, He said, Father, into Thy hands I commend My spirit: and having said this, He gave up the ghost [His life].” (Luke 23:46)

- d. His Marvelous Resurrection – “He is not here: for He is risen, as He said.” (Matthew 28:6)
 - f. His Imparted Boldness – “Now **when they saw the boldness** of Peter and John, and perceived that they were unlearned and ignorant men, they marveled; and **they took knowledge of them, that they had been with Jesus.**” (Acts 4:13)
- B. The **Promise** of the Command – “And, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world.”
- 1. When the disciples traveled with Jesus they didn’t need supernatural power to deal with the needs of the people. They only needed to bring the needy to Jesus and HE would help them out of the abundance of His power.
 - 2. We don’t have to come up with the power, all we have to do is depend on the fact that HE is with us.
 - 3. That’s how Jesus lived – “For the Father loves the Son, and shows Him all things that Himself does: and He will show Him **greater works** than these, that you may marvel.” (John 5:20).
 - 4. That’s how we are to live – “Verily, verily, [truly, truly] I say unto you, He that believes on Me, the works that I do shall he do also; and greater works than these shall he do; because I go unto My Father.” (John 14:12).
- C. The **Prostration** to the Command – “Amen”
- 1. Amen - so it is, so be it, may it be fulfilled
 - 2. We must submit to God’s plan if we are to be a part of it.
 - 3. “Then said Jesus unto His disciples, If any [man] will come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow Me.” (Matthew 16:24)
 - 4. “I am **crucified with Christ**: nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ lives in me: and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave Himself for me.” (Galatians 2:20)
- D. The **Purpose** of the Command – “If any man speak, let him speak as the oracles of God; if any man minister, let him do it as of the ability which God gives: **that God in all things may be glorified** through Jesus Christ, to Whom be praise and dominion for ever and ever. Amen.” (1 Peter 4:11)

#4

Understanding the inability of the flesh to please God

We have seen an overview of our inheritance, including the gift of God's infallible Word, which is sufficient to meet our every need. Lessons 4-7 will add some details concerning our need and appropriation of our inheritance. Lessons 8-11 will deal with a few critical areas of life in which we can count on this inheritance to enable us. This lesson is the bad news, but it is necessary to see the futility of our flesh before we will be serious about looking to God's promised presence in our lives. As you are completing this lesson, please remember what Christ promises us in II Corinthians 12:9: "My grace **is** sufficient for you: for My strength is made perfect **in weakness.**"

THE REALIZATION OF THE PROBLEM

Many ask the question: "If God really is powerful and has given me power over sin, why am I not experiencing this power to overcome my temptations?" Let's look at a few verses that get to the root of the problem.

1. Is God unable to hear our cries for help and "save us" from ourselves?

What is the problem? _____

Isaiah 59:1-2 Behold, the Lord's hand is not shortened, that it cannot save; neither His ear heavy, that it cannot hear: But **your iniquities [sins] have separated** between you and your God, and **your sins have hid** His face from you, that He will not hear.

2. What kind of sin causes the Lord not to hear us when we pray?

Psalm 66:18 If I **regard iniquity [sin]** in my heart, the Lord will not hear me:

God is not going to help us with one area of our lives while we rebel against Him in another area. We must understand that *harboring known sin* in any area of our lives causes God to see us as opposing Him. Therefore, we are not available to receive His enabling grace.

3. The word “world” has different meanings in various places throughout the Bible. What does it mean in this verse?

1 John 2:16 For all that is in the world, **the lust of the flesh**, and **the lust of the eyes**, and **the pride of life**, is not of the Father, but is of the world.

4. What does God call us when we try to maintain our relationship with the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes and the pride of life?

James 4:4 Don't you know that the friendship of the world is **enmity with God**? Whoever therefore will be a friend of the world is the **enemy of God**.

Romans 8:7 teaches us why this is true. “Because the carnal (fleshly) mind is enmity against God: for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be.”

THE FAILURE OF YIELDING TO THE WEAKNESS OF THE FLESH

5. The new spirit God has created in us is willing to do right, but what is our weakness?

Matthew 26:41 Watch and pray, that you enter not into temptation: the spirit indeed is willing, **but the flesh is weak**.

Let's look at a few areas where the flesh will cause us to sin and, thus, separate us from the power of God.

The Sensual Sins of the Flesh: The lust of the flesh

6. God tells us now that we are believers it is incongruous for us to participate in the sensual sins in which many in our world participate. How does this type of sin affect us now that we are joined to Christ in salvation?
-

What are we to do about it? _____

I Corinthians 6:13-18 ... Now the body is not for fornication [physical intimacy outside of marriage], but for the Lord;... Know you not that your bodies are the members of Christ? shall I then take the members of Christ, and make them the members of an harlot? God forbid. What? know you not that he which is joined to an harlot is one body? for two, saith He, shall be one flesh. But he that is joined unto the Lord is one spirit. **Flee fornication.** Every sin that a man doeth is without the body; but he that commits fornication **sins against his own body.**

In Matthew 5:28 Jesus Himself told His followers not to even “look on a woman to lust after her” because it produced a deadening effect on the spiritual life of the inner man. Romans 8:13 teaches, “if you live after the **flesh**, you shall die.” Death, in this case, is separation from God. Now clearly it is not the loss of eternal salvation, but it does take away that close relationship with God that gives us the zeal, desire and ability to please Him. Sensual sins of the flesh come in many different forms, e.g., binge-eating, drunkenness, illicit drug use, etc.

The Materialistic Sins of the Flesh: The lust of the eyes

7. Does the Bible say it is wrong to be rich? What does it say is wrong?

I Timothy 6:9-10 But they that **will be** rich fall into temptation and a snare, and into many foolish and hurtful lusts, which drown men in destruction and perdition. For **the love of money** is the root of all [kinds of] evil: which while some coveted after; they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows.

Note: With each of these sin categories, the most destructive problem is the progressive nature of sin. Romans 6:19 teaches when we “yield” ourselves to sin, that sin has an energy of its own, which moves us deeper into sin.

Materialistic sins of the flesh also come in many different forms, e.g., living outside our means, excessive debt, not being content with what we have, covetousness, etc.

The Social Sins of the Flesh: The pride of life

The “social” sins are so called because they affect our relationships with others. Some of these manifestations of pride are: being quick to anger, snipping at people with our words, manipulating or trying to control others, looking down on those who are different than we are, talking about people behind their backs, refusing to forgive, bitterness, etc.

8. It may appear that these are “little sins,” but what does the Bible say about the sin of bitterness (unforgiveness)?

Hebrews 12:15-16 Looking diligently lest any man fail of the grace of God; lest any root of bitterness springing up trouble you, **and thereby many be defiled**; Lest there be any fornicator, or profane person.

Lesson 1 gave a description of the nature of man in Romans 3. Romans is a book that deals with man’s nature and God’s provision of righteousness to correct the problem of sin in our lives. Romans 1-3 shows us the wickedness of our flesh. Romans 4-5 shows us the provision of Christ for the justification of the sin in our lives. Romans 6-8 shows us the provision of Christ for the sanctification of the life of the believer. A believer is one who has placed his confidence in Christ alone for the forgiveness of his sins. Now that you are a believer, God wants you to **live** like Him. In fact, 1 Peter 1:16 teaches us to “Be holy; for I am holy.” The word “sanctify” and the phrase “make holy” are essentially the same.

Romans 1-3 shows how bad man is so that when we get to Romans 4-5 we realize *God does all the saving*, and we can do nothing to help ourselves but trust in His gracious provision.

Romans 6 shows us God’s provision for salvation includes a present “saving from the power of sin.” Before He shows us how to access that part of His salvation in chapter 8, He again shows us the inability of self (our flesh) to overcome the indwelling law of sin that still resides in our flesh. He shows us that *in sanctification as well as in salvation He does all the saving*. We can do nothing to help ourselves but trust in His gracious provision.

Looking at Romans 7 gives us an idea of how powerless our flesh is to change us into Christ’s likeness.

9. Answer these questions after reading the following excerpt from Scripture.

Romans 7:18-24 For I know that in me (that is, in my flesh,) **dwells no good thing**: for to will is present with me; but **how to perform that which is good I find not**. For the good that I would [want to do] I do not: but the evil which I would not [don't want to do], that I do. Now if I do that I would not [don't want to do], it is no more I that do it, but **sin** that dwells in me. I find then a law, that, when I would [want to] do good, evil is present with me. For I delight in the law of God after the inward man: But I see another law in my members, warring against the law of my mind, and bringing me into captivity to **the law of sin which is in my members**. O wretched man that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death?

➤ Does anything good reside in the flesh?

➤ Can the flesh help me do what is right before God?

➤ What is dwelling in me that causes me to consistently do wrong?

➤ What is the law of indwelling sin?

➤ What are some good things you think you should be doing?

➤ What keeps you from doing those things?

The law of indwelling sin is like the law of gravity. Gravity is the constant pull toward the center of the earth. It is a law that can never be broken, though it can be overcome by a stronger force. The law of indwelling sin is the constant pull within each man to sin. This principle dwells in every man and cannot be broken. No wonder Paul cries out in such anguish! However, the next verse does let us know there is hope. "I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord. So then with the mind I myself serve the law of God; but with the flesh the law of sin" (Romans

7:25). Just as gravity can be overcome by the law of hot air rising in a hot air balloon, the law of indwelling sin can be overcome by the law of righteousness found in Jesus Christ. It is important to understand, however, that though the weakness of the flesh leads to sin, the strength of human energy (flesh) cannot produce anything better.

THE FAILURE OF LEANING ON THE STRENGTH OF THE FLESH

We know that the flesh is not strong enough to give us salvation. Even if a man tries with all of his might to be good enough to get to Heaven, he can never do it. Titus 3:5 teaches that it is “Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to His mercy He saved us.” However, somehow many people have come to believe that the road to sanctification (becoming holy in thought and deed) is earned through self-effort.

The Flesh is Profitless

10. Can the flesh be profitable for sanctification?

John 6:63

It is the Spirit that quickens [gives life]; **the flesh profits nothing.**

11. What does God say about the man who is depending on his self-efforts of human energy?

Jeremiah 17:5

Thus says the LORD; **Cursed is the man that trusts in man**, and makes flesh his arm [strength, or confidence].

Verse 9 explains why we can't supply any help to God's work of making us holy in thought and deed. “The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked: who can know it?” Are you trying to be a good spouse? - It is profitless if it is *YOU TRYING!* Are you trying to be a good parent? - It is profitless if it is *YOU TRYING!* Are you trying to have victory over sin? - It is profitless if it is *YOU TRYING!*

12. What is going to happen to the Christian's works that are done through self-dependence?

1 Corinthians 3:11-15 For other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ. Now if any man build upon this foundation gold, silver, precious stones, **wood, hay, stubble**; Every man's work shall be made manifest [shown for

what it is]: for the day shall declare it, because it **shall be revealed by fire**; and the fire shall try every man's work of what sort it is. If any man's work abide which he has built thereupon, he shall receive a reward. If any man's **work shall be burned**, he shall suffer loss: but he himself shall be saved; yet so as by fire.

Flesh-Dependent Living Is Counterproductive

13. What does the Bible say about Bible-based preaching done in dependence on the flesh?

II Corinthians 3:6 For the **letter kills**, but the Spirit gives life.

In the context of the passage, "letter" refers to truth apart from the effective work of the Holy Spirit. Even Bible preaching can be done in the energy of the flesh, and this passage teaches that kind of ministry is counterproductive.

Flesh-Dependence is Sin

14. What does the Bible call anything that is not done in dependence on the Lord?

Romans 14:23 ...whatsoever is not of faith is **sin**.

THE REASON FOR THIS DILEMMA

15. Why would God leave us in such frail human bodies?

2 Corinthians 4:7 But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, **that the excellency of the power may be of God, and not of us.**

APPLICATION

James 1:22-25 promises God's special blessing on those who take action on what His Word teaches.

In this lesson you have seen that sin is damaging to the Christian life and there is no ability to overcome its overwhelming control by our own self-efforts. Our only hope is the answer found in the Lord. We will look at the details concerning His provision in the next several lessons. Your need today is to admit the inability of your flesh and determine to look to God as your only source of victory. Will you do this today?

Understanding the promise of Christ's Life in me

We have already seen that we will never escape the negative pull of the flesh. It is like the constant pull of gravity. No matter how hard we “try,” we will never outgrow its effects. Although there is nothing we can do to make the flesh better, the Lord has promised and provided victory for our lives. This lesson will focus on those promises, study the reality of His provision and touch on accessing it.

THE PROMISE OF VICTORY

1. What does God always provide? _____

In Whom? _____

II Corinthians 2:14 Now thanks be unto God, which **always causes us to triumph** [literally - *puts victory on parade in us*] **in Christ**, and makes manifest [clearly sensed] the savor [fragrance] of His knowledge by us in every place.

2. What kind of life did Christ promise those who follow Him?

John 10:10b I am come that they might have **life**, and that they might have it more **abundantly**.

3. What kind of work did Christ promise those that believe on Him?

Why? _____

John 14:12 Verily, verily [truly, truly], I say unto you, He that believes on me, the works that I do shall he do also; and **greater works than these shall he do**; because I go unto My Father.

4. How much fruit does Jesus promise to those who abide in Him?

John 15:5 I am the vine, you are the branches: He that abides in Me, and I in him, the same **brings forth much fruit**: for without Me you can do nothing.

5. How much victory over fleshly desires does God promise when we walk in the Spirit?

Galatians 5:16 This I say then, walk in the Spirit, and **you shall not fulfill the lust** [desires] **of the flesh**.

6. Is Christ able to keep you from falling back into sin?

Jude 1:24-25 Now unto Him that is able **to keep you from falling**, and to present you faultless ... both now and ever.

7. What has God done for us?

Colossians 1:13 Who **has delivered us** from the power of darkness, and **has translated us** into the kingdom of His dear Son:

8. Who gives us both the desire and ability to do the things that please God, God or self?

Philippians 2:13 For **it is God which works in you both to will and to do** of His good pleasure.

All these promises of victory over sin and power for ministry do not remove the tendency to do wrong from the Christian. Remember in Lesson 4 that we discovered the law of sin still resides in the believer and has a tendency to keep us from doing what is right, even when we want to do right (Romans 7:18-24). *What Jesus is promising us is not a removal of the principle of sin, but a **counteraction** of it.* For example, a person with myopia will have trouble seeing things at a distance as long as he lives, but corrective lenses counteract the problem. The problem is not removed;

but as long as the lenses are in place, he can see as well as if he didn't have myopia. He must choose to depend on the glasses before they will help him. As soon as he takes his glasses off, he will revert to his former way of seeing. In a similar manner, Romans 13:14 teaches us to "put ... on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make not provision for the flesh, to fulfill the lusts thereof." As long as we are depending on Him, He gives us the ability to refuse the desires of our flesh, though we may still feel them.

THE PERSON OF VICTORY

9. In a spiritual sense, where and what is Christ today?

Colossians 1:27 To whom God would make known what is the riches of the glory of this mystery among the Gentiles; **which is Christ in you, the hope of glory:**

10. Who is still alive and living His life though us?

Galatians 2:20 I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless I live; **yet not I, but Christ lives in me:** and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, Who loved me, and gave Himself for me.

Hudson Taylor called this the Exchanged Life. We exchange our life for His. This ability was given you the day you received Christ (Romans 6).

11. How does one live this exchanged life?

Galatians 2:20 I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ lives in me: and the life which I now live in the flesh I live **by the faith** of the Son of God, Who loved me, and gave Himself for me.

The Exchanged Life is a gift, not something we get by working for it. In Galatians 3:1-3 Paul chides the Christians in Galatia for struggling to gain the ability to live for Christ in the flesh after receiving salvation as a gift through grace. Christ wants to give us the power of His life, but we must choose to depend on Him.

If we are struggling to get rid of a “besetting sin” then it is us striving and Paul taught “**yet not I, but Christ lives in me.**” It is Christ’s Life lived out in the believer who is choosing to depend on Him. Paul makes it clear that he, Paul, is the one who is living, yet it is Christ who is living in him. A good illustration of this may be found in a piece of iron. It is cold, dull black and unbending. If that same piece of iron is put into the blacksmith’s fire, it becomes hot, glowing red and malleable. We could say that the fire is in the iron and has changed its characteristics, though it would still have the tendency to return to its former state as soon as it is removed from the fire. Christ is the fire; we are the cold, dull, unbending iron. What is seen in the iron is not the iron-life, but the fire-life. What is seen in the Spirit-filled Christian is not the self-life, but the Christ-life.

12. What does Christ offer to those who attach themselves to Him through belief?

John 7:38-39 He that believes on Me, as the Scripture has said, **out of his belly** [inner man] **shall flow** rivers of living water. (But this spoke He of **the Spirit**....)

13. What does the Son give to those who live in Him?

John 8:36 If the **Son** therefore shall make you free, **you shall be free** indeed.

14. From what does Jesus deliver us?

Galatians 1:4 Who [Jesus] gave Himself for our sins, that He might deliver us from **this present evil world**, according to the will of God and our Father

15. Whose life is clearly seen in the life of one who chooses to identify with the death of Christ through death to self?

II Corinthians 4:10 Always bearing about in the body the dying of the Lord Jesus, that **the life also of Jesus** might be made manifest in our body.

The word “manifest” is an interesting word that appears often in the Bible. It is not just being Christ-like. It is showing Christ’s *life* through yours. A good illustration of this is a room that has an inherent tendency to be dark. Imagine a room without any windows or doors. It has no ability in its own nature to be light. The characteristic of the room is darkness. Now place a bright light in the center of that room. Immediately the characteristic of the room is changed from darkness to light. The room itself did not change. If the light were to be turned out (stopped being depended upon) the characteristic of the room would once again plunge into darkness. Our life has the awful characteristics of darkness with no ability to have light, but Jesus is light. When we place Him at the center of our life through yielding to, and depending on Him, He changes the characteristics of our life from those of darkness to those of light. It is not that we have simply become Christ-like, but have allowed the Christ-life to shine through us. This is what it means to have the life of Jesus made manifest in our body.

So, how do we do this? The answer is simple faith. “Therefore being justified **by faith**, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ: **By Whom also** we have access **by faith** into this grace wherein we stand, and rejoice in hope of the glory of God” (Romans 5:1-2). Faith that accesses justification has three essential elements: Understanding, Agreeing and Depending.* Faith that accesses the “grace wherein we stand” has those same three essential elements, though they may be expressed somewhat differently, because now we are trusting God for a change of practice and not a positional change.

The idea is that you personally consider the truths concerning the crucifixion and resurrection of Christ to be true about yourself now that you have been placed into Him at salvation.

The day you were saved Christ accomplished in you what you could never have done for yourself. He did not die symbolically in your place. He died **literally** in your place! You received the full benefit of all that Christ did; and all that Christ is; He is in you. The old nature that kept you from being able to relate to God is gone. It died with Christ on the cross. In its place is a new regenerated nature that is perfectly related to God through the resurrection power of Jesus. This new birth did not affect the flesh or the law of sin in your body, both of which are still vying for control of your actions. It did, however, open the way for you to relate to God openly, without any hesitation. “Let us therefore **come boldly** unto the throne of grace” (Hebrews 4:16a). You are a new person. “... if any man be **in Christ**, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things

are become new.” (II Corinthians 5:17). You now have the ability to allow Jesus to produce genuine godly living through your life. You can choose to continue on in sin if you desire, but you have the power through your participation in the crucifixion and resurrection of Christ to live apart from sin and pleasing to God.

Paul uses an analogy that we all understand because we all have to live with the weakness of our own flesh. Have you ever been in a conversation in which you

only meant to share a small tidbit of gossip and you ended up saying a whole lot more than you intended? Have you ever decided to take a peek at something you knew you shouldn't look at and ended up watching the whole thing, or looking at the whole magazine, etc.? Paul is teaching us that just like sin carries us along in an ebb of seemingly irresistible current once we choose to yield to its influence, even so grace carries the Christian along who chooses to yield to the Holy Spirit's influence in dependent obedience. Grace is the energy that enables the "instrument" to function in power.

APPLICATION

James 1:22-25 promises God's special blessing on those who take action on what His Word teaches.

In this lesson you have seen that God has promised us victory over sin through our relationship with the crucified and risen Savior. Your job is not to work up the willpower to overcome sin. Your job is ¹to understand the foundation for victory in Jesus, ²consider that victory already yours personally. Then ³begin making choices to depend on that reality by simply choosing not to do wrong and start doing right. You have the power as part of the inheritance you received in salvation. Will you choose to start depending on that power and yielding to its victory today?

THE FINALITY OF MY SURRENDER

Appropriating the power of God in my life

From our first lesson we learned there are parts of our inheritance that are in our spiritual “bank account,” but we must continue to access them, or write checks for them, if we are to gain their practical benefit. Romans 5:1-2 taught us faith was the access to the grace that gave us peace with God, and we also receive grace to stand in hope of God’s glory by faith. Sanctification (living out the glory of God’s holiness) is accessed not by our hard work, but rather, by faith in the finished work of Christ on the cross and the continuing work of Christ on His throne.

There are three elements to faith that access victory over sin and power for living. What were the three words that represented these three elements in Romans 6? (Feel free to look back at Lesson 5.)

The words were: “Apprehend” or “Know” - “Agree with” or “Reckon” - “Appropriate” or “Yield.” Before a person can really “believe” something, all three of these elements must be present. One cannot “believe” something that he does not personally understand. Nor can he “believe” something that he understands but with which he doesn’t personally agree. And most importantly he does not really “believe” in something until he is depending on it for himself. It is this last element that causes many people to miss the faith that accesses God’s grace.

The word “yield” in Romans 6 carries with it two main ideas. The first is to **expect** victory to come and, thus, step out in confidence of that victory. The second is to **yield** our “self” to God in such a way that there is nothing between our soul and the Savior. These are the affirmative and negative sides of faith. The negative is saying no to my “self,” recognizing that “my way” won’t work; and the affirmative is saying yes to my Savior, being convinced of His victory to the point of action.

THE NEGATIVE SIDE OF FAITH

Death to the self-life

Self-life - trusting in self and living for self

1. Read Romans 6:16 & 19 again. These verses teach us a practical way to begin to draw on the righteousness of Jesus that was deposited in our account when we first received Jesus Christ as our own personal Savior.

Romans 6:16; 19 Know you not, that to whom you **yield yourselves servants** to obey, his **servants** you are to whom you obey; whether of sin unto death, or of obedience unto righteousness? I speak after the manner of men because of the infirmity of your flesh: for **as you have yielded** your members servants to uncleanness and to iniquity unto iniquity; **even so now yield** your members servants to righteousness unto holiness.

- What words in verse 16 indicate a necessary change in order to be able to obey God?

- We have been slaves to sin all our lives. What can we learn about sin's mastery over us that can teach us how to let righteousness rule in our lives?
-

Do you remember a time when you made a decision to do something wrong and sensed that there seemed to be an energy that swept you along in sin with hardly the ability to stop until the sin was done, e.g., saying angry words, stepping into immorality, stealing something from a store, etc.? This passage teaches the same kind of energy from God's Holy Spirit will carry you along to do something that God wants you to do once you **yield** yourself to Him for that task. **Yielding means to stop trusting in my abilities and stop trying to please myself.** The same Greek word that is translated "yield" in Romans 6:13, 16 and 19 is translated "present" in Romans 12:1.

2. Once you understand and agree with these truths, what does God plead for you to do?

Romans 12:1-2 I beseech you therefore, brothers, by the **mercies of God**, that you **present your bodies a living sacrifice**, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world: but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God.

- What gives a Christian the ability to present his body as a living sacrifice?

- How would you describe a life that has been presented to God as a “living sacrifice”?

The word “sacrifice” may sound like simply giving something up, but to the world in which Paul was writing it could mean only one thing - DEATH. Yet, it is called a “living sacrifice.”

- In Galatians 2:20 Paul wrote, “**I am crucified** with Christ: nevertheless **I live**; yet not I, but Christ lives in me.” Do you see both death and life in this verse?

You learned from Romans 6 that when you were placed into Jesus the day you were saved, you were placed into His death. *You are dead to the old sinful nature. Dying to self is not a new activity on your part. Dying to self is simply choosing to live in the reality of what He did for you at salvation. It is part of “writing the checks” to the inheritance He gave us. It is real. Now I must depend on its reality by not living to please self.*

- What is our relationship to “this world” after we have presented our bodies as a living sacrifice to God?

3. What did Jesus teach was the cost of true discipleship?

Matthew 10:37-39 He that loves father or mother more than Me is not worthy of Me: and he that loves son or daughter more than Me is not worthy of Me. And **he that takes not his cross**, and follows after Me, is not worthy of Me. He that finds his life shall lose it: and **he that loses his life** for My sake shall find it.

Matthew 16:24-26 Then said Jesus unto His disciples, If any man will come after Me, let him **deny himself**, and **take up his cross**, and follow Me. For whosoever will save his life shall lose it: and whosoever will **lose his life** for My sake shall find it. For what is a man profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?

Luke 14:27-33 And whosoever does not bear his cross, and come after Me, cannot be My disciple. For which of you, intending to build a tower, sits not down first, and **counts the cost**, whether he has sufficient to finish it? Lest, after he has laid the foundation, and is not able to finish it, all that behold it begin to mock him, saying, "This man began to build, and was not able to finish." Or what king, going to make war against another king, sits not down first, and **consults whether he is able** with ten thousand to meet him that cometh against him with twenty thousand? Or else, while the other is yet a great way off, he sends an ambassador, and desires conditions of peace. So likewise, whoever he is of you that **forsakes not all that he has**, he cannot be My disciple.

Some enter this place of surrender at salvation. Others come to it a little at a time, but many have a point in time in which they choose to surrender all to Jesus. **This surrender is** not a work, but a decision. It is not deciding to do better or trying harder, but **choosing to believe Him trustworthy and yielding all the pieces of your life to His control**. Amy Carmichael said it this way, "In acceptance lieth peace." It is accepting the fact that everything in my life that is out of my control is in His control and is given to me for my good.

Romans 8:28 And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to His purpose.

Surrender is yielding to His control all of the areas about which we have a choice. It is not a passive surrender, but an active giving of all that I am and all that I have to Him. To refuse to take this step of consecration is to live in suspicion of God's power and goodness. To take this step is to choose to depend on the fact that He is sovereign and that He is good.

A song we that we often sing in church well summarizes this choice of your will. Will you read it carefully and consider making it your prayer of surrender?

All to Jesus I surrender,
All to Him I freely give;
I will ever love and trust Him,
In His presence daily live.

All to Jesus I surrender,
Humbly at His feet I bow;
Worldly pleasures all forsaken,
Take me, Jesus, take me now.

All to Jesus I surrender,
Make me Savior wholly Thine;
Let me feel the Holy Spirit,
Truly know that Thou art mine.

All to Jesus I surrender,
Lord, I give myself to Thee;
Fill me with Thy love and power,
Let Thy blessing fall on me.

I surrender all,
I surrender all;
All to Thee, my blessed Savior,
I surrender all.

THE AFFIRMATIVE SIDE OF FAITH

Living the Christ-life

Being convinced of His victory to the point of action

4. What kind of living sacrifice is God expecting from us?

Romans 12:1-2 I beseech you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, that you present your bodies a living sacrifice, **holy, acceptable unto God**, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world: but be transformed

by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what is that **good, and acceptable, and perfect**, will of God.

Notice the verbs of command used in this passage.

Romans 12:1-2 I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that you **present your bodies** a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And **be not conformed** to this world: but **be transformed** by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God.

All three main verbs are commands. The first verb is an active, once-and-for-all presentation of your body to the Lord. When you present your body to God, He takes it. The transaction is complete. The next two verbs are passive and ongoing. “Be not conformed” means to stop being pressured into the mold of the world. (This concept will be further discussed in Lesson 8.) The idea of “be transformed” is the progressive transformation into one who is showing the “good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God.” Notice - this is passive. God must do the changing. Notice also, this is ongoing. You now have the ongoing responsibility to remind yourself (the renewing of your mind) that you belong to Him. He will be faithful to progressively transform you into His image throughout the remainder of your earthly existence. Your part in this transformation is to simply renew that vow with every decision you make. (We will discuss ways of doing this in Lesson 7.)

The word “transform” means to be totally changed from the inside out. The English word “metamorphosis” comes from this word in the Greek language. It is used only four times in the Bible. Twice it describes Christ, and twice it describes what Christ wants to do to His disciples.

When Jesus was here on earth, His deity was veiled by His human body. Toward the end of His earthly ministry He took three of His disciples to the top of a mountain.

5. In your own words describe what Jesus looked like.

Matthew 17:2 And was transfigured [transformed] before them: and His face did shine as the sun, and His raiment was white as the light.

For a moment Jesus pulled back the veil and allowed His disciples to see His deity. The Bible teaches He is **now** in you; and in the same way, He wants to show the world His nature through changing you.

6. With whom is God satisfied?

Matthew 3:17 And lo a voice from Heaven, saying, "This is **My beloved Son**, in Whom I am well pleased."

Matthew 17:5 While He yet spoke, behold, a bright cloud overshadowed them: and behold a voice out of the cloud, which said, This is **My beloved Son**, in Whom I am well pleased; hear Him.

7. Describe how God saw Christ on the cross.

Ephesians 5:2 And walk in love, as Christ also has loved us, and has given Himself for us an offering and a sacrifice to God for a **sweet smelling savor** [fragrance].

8. In a similar way, how do we satisfy God?

II Corinthians 2:15a For we are unto God a sweet savor [fragrance] **of Christ..**

We will never be holy and acceptable to God through our own ability. This is why we must say no to "self." Our acceptance comes from Christ and His ability to transform us.

9. What does God promise you?

I Corinthians 10:13 There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man: but God is faithful, **who will not suffer you to be tempted above that you are able**; but will with the temptation also **make a way to escape, that you may be able to bear it.**

➤ Would He tell you this if there were no real way of escape?

➤ Can you count on this promise for your life?

As a Christian you have grace through Christ to live victoriously before God. You may not always feel like you have the strength, but remember the Martin Luther poem:

*Feelings come and feelings go,
And feelings are deceiving,
My warrant is the Word of God
Naught else is worth believing.*

You have been given the power of the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus, not the **feelings** of that power. **Your feelings are not a reliable source of truth.** You have the ability to choose to yield your body to the power of Christ's victory or to yield to the feelings of defeat you may experience. Consider the following illustration: Imagine three men walking in a line. Mr. Fact knows which way, but Mr. Feeling doesn't feel right about the direction and wants to go another way. Mr. Faith is the one who must decide which direction to take. If he follows Mr. Feeling, they will leave Mr. Fact behind because he never changes. If Mr. Faith follows Mr. Fact, Mr. Feeling will come along behind - he never goes away. In fact, he will be complaining all along the way; but if Mr. Faith will hold firm and keep following Mr. Fact, eventually Mr. Feeling will change his mind, and they will all go along together happily – until Mr. Fact and Mr. Feeling disagree again.

I use a little couplet to help me remember that I have the power to choose righteous living even when I don't **feel** righteous.

*Act not on what you feel,
But based on what is real!*

10. When is God's grace sufficient for you?

II Corinthians 12:9 My grace **is** sufficient for you: for My strength is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me.

Webb Peplow, a preacher in the late 1800's, struggled with the answer to this question. He had been on a holiday at the seashore. He tells the story, "My little daughter was taken sick and died. I had to carry the little coffin in my arms all the way home where I buried my little one with my own hands." He was to preach the next morning and settled on the text, "My grace is sufficient for you."

He continues the story, "I sat down to prepare my notes, but soon found myself 'murmuring in my tent' against God for all He called upon me to bear. I flung down my pen, threw myself on my knees and said to God, 'It is not sufficient, it is not sufficient! Lord, let Your grace be sufficient. O Lord, do!'"

A beautifully illustrated Scripture text hung on the wall above his table. "As I opened my eyes I was saying, 'O God let Your grace be sufficient for me,' and there on the wall I saw,

'MY GRACE IS SUFFICIENT FOR YOU.'

The word 'is' was in bright green; 'my' was in black, and 'you' in black. 'MY grace is sufficient for YOU.' I heard a voice that seemed to say to me, 'You fool, how dare you ask God to make what is! Get up and take, and you will find it true. When God says "is" it is for you to believe Him and you will find it true at every moment.' That 'is' turned my life; from that moment I could say, 'O God, whatever Thou didst say in Thy Word I believe, and . . . I will step out on it.'"

Will you step out on God's Word today? Go back and read the promises on pages 69 and 70. They are true. You can count on them. You can step out on them. It is really a matter of *submission* to God. Do you *trust* Him enough to submit? There is a dividing line in the sand of time that determines those that experience God's grace and those that don't.

DIVIDING LINE

When we received Christ we became sons of God. "But as many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His name" (John 1:12). Now that we are His children, He is responsible for us. As a good father He is constantly pouring out energy toward us. Though we do not influence *whether* He pours out that energy on us, we do have the ability to determine *what kind* of energy He aims at us.

11. What kind of energy is God pouring out on man in each of these verses, and what provokes it?

Proverbs 3:34

Surely He **scorns the scorners**: but He **gives grace unto the lowly**.

James 4:6

But He gives more grace. Wherefore He says, "God **resists the proud**, but **gives grace unto the humble**."

1 Peter 5:5

Be clothed with humility: for God **resists the proud**, and **gives grace to the humble**.

The word "resist" is a military word that describes a long persistent siege on a city. When we live as if we know better than God, He cannot give us His grace, but must continue to press us to Himself through His resistance. Isn't it time for you to surrender? Simply humble yourself before Him. **Yield to all His claims and trust all the promises in His Word.** He "gives grace to the humble." The word "grace" is supernatural enabling from God to do His will. This enabling from God is real. You can count on it. Will you choose to step out on it today?

APPLICATION

James 1:22-25 promises God's special blessing on those who take action on what His Word teaches.

In this lesson you have seen that God expects us to step out on His Word and trust Him. Will you present yourself completely to Him today?

If your answer is yes, write your resolve in the form of a prayer. If your answer is no, write the areas of your life in which you are not willing to yield to Him and ask Him to make you willing to surrender.

THE FILLING OF MY SPIRIT

Experiencing the realities of God's grace in my life

If you've surrendered your life to Jesus, it was not a one-time act that made you "spiritual" from that point on. It was an entrance into the Spirit-filled life that grows and must now be maintained. It will not be maintained by struggling to be good or do right, but by simply continuing on in faith. Surrendering to the Spirit-filled life was a decision that was a **step** of faith. Living the Spirit-filled life is now maintained by a **walk** of faith. Growth comes when you know more and more of His nature. As you grow in understanding and experience, you grow **spiritually** when you choose to "reckon" each lesson true for your own life. Then you must "yield" yourself to obey or depend on that truth for the next step in your Christian walk. This lesson will investigate growing in grace, walking in the Spirit and enjoying a steady life of victory in Christ.

THE INDWELLING OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

I. Who is the Comforter Jesus promises to send to His disciples?

John 14:16-18 And I [Jesus] will pray the Father; and He shall give you **another** [One just like Me] **Comforter** [One who calls men alongside Himself], that He may abide [remain] with you for ever; even the **Spirit of truth**; Whom the world cannot receive, **because it sees Him not, neither knows Him**: but you know Him; for He dwells with you, and shall be in you. I will not leave you comfortless [orphaned]: **I will come to you.**

➤ Why can't an unbeliever have the Holy Spirit dwell in him or her?

➤ How did you come to know the Holy Spirit?

(We come to "know" the Holy Spirit by receiving Christ as our Savior.)

➤ How did Jesus plan to comfort His disciples?

2. Now that you “know” Him, where does He live?

I Corinthians 6:19 What? Know you not that your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit which is in you, which you have of God, and you are not your own?

Everyone that is born again has “passed from death to life” and is now “indwelt” by the Holy Spirit. That means that He lives in you, but it does not necessarily mean that you are “filled” with the Holy Spirit.

PICTURES OF SPIRIT-FILLED LIVING

3. To what does the Bible contrast being filled with the Holy Spirit?

Ephesians 5:18 And be not **drunk with wine**, wherein is excess; but be filled with the Spirit.

What does a person have to do to be drunk with wine? They have to give themselves liberally to the wine, and it begins to control their every thought and action. It is as if they become another person. Note this is a command. God expects us to give the Holy Spirit control of our every thought and action. Then He begins to give us the grace to be what we could never be without Him. You may ask the question – Will I simply be a robot without my own personality and volition?

4. What analogy does the Lord use of the grace He gives to us regarding our speech?

Colossians 4:6 Let your speech be always with grace, **seasoned with salt**, that you may know how you ought to answer every man.

If a person puts salt on food, it enhances the taste and makes it more inviting to eat, but it does not change the nature of the food. In a similar way the Holy Spirit changes us, but we still retain the elements that make us the unique individual God created us to be. Another illustration might be the three human authors God used to write the Synoptic Gospels - Matthew, Mark and Luke. The Scripture tells us that these men were completely controlled by the Holy Spirit, yet we clearly see the personality, viewpoint and vocabulary of each individual author. The Holy

Spirit's control over us causes us to be active, not passive. He does not bypass our own emotions, mind and will. He brings each to the height of its capacity by supplying us with His supernatural ability.

5. In each of the following passages the result is exactly the same. What causes the result in each verse?

Ephesians 5:18-19 And be not drunk with wine, wherein is excess; but **be filled with the Spirit**; speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord.

Colossians 3:16 **Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom**; teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord.

Being filled with the Spirit of Christ and having the Word of Christ living luxuriously in a person is one and the same thing. There is a mystical oneness between Christ and His Word in that He uses the Bible to progressively reveal more and more of Himself to us. This is how to “grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ” (2 Peter 3:18a). As we give Him free access to all the rooms of our life with each successive truth, promise or command, we experience a greater sense of His presence and His power. It is very similar to a close, growing human relationship. A husband and wife may have a superb relationship at the point of marriage; but as they grow to know each other better, only then can they adjust themselves to best fit their lives together. The main difference in our relationship with Jesus is that He never changes, but is consistently, supernaturally changing us to fit our lives to Him more and more as we give Him access to do so.

It is important to be aware of this fact. If at any point along the way we say “no” to Him, we not only cease to grow, we cease to give the Holy Spirit control of our every thought and action. Therefore, we cease to be Spirit-filled.

Lesson 7: The Filling of My Spirit

6. This is not to say that the Spirit-filled life is a sinless life. What does the Bible say about the man who says he is perfect and without sin?

1 John 1:8 If we say that we have no sin, **we deceive ourselves**, and the truth is not in us.

7. What kind of sin keeps a man from God's power?

Psalm 66:18 If I **regard iniquity in my heart**, the Lord will not hear me:

God is patient with our ignorance. We will constantly be learning more about Him until the day we die. We will keep learning more of what He likes and what He doesn't like. As long as we are walking through life with Him and allowing Him to change us to fit with our growing understanding of Him, He will continue to give us His grace. Remember what causes God to resist a man? – **Pride**.

James 4:6b God resists the proud, but gives grace unto the humble.

Pride is when we think that we know better than God. When we say no to God and take our life off of the altar of complete sacrifice, God can no longer give us His enabling grace. We will be stuck in a pattern of spiritual battle against God. We will be without ability to do anything that is pleasing to Him until we rid ourselves of our rebellion and look to Him to re-establish His grace in our lives.

8. How do we rid ourselves of the sin and unrighteousness of the self-life?

1 John 1:9 **If we confess our sins**, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

9. What is the sign of insincere confession to God?
-

What is the sign of genuine confession?

Proverbs 28:13 He that **covers his sins** shall not prosper: but whoever confesses and **forsakes them** shall have mercy.

Complete surrender is a crisis of faith that gives us entrance into the Spirit-filled life in which Christ lives His life of victory and power through ours because we have chosen to allow Him to do so. Whether a person understands complete surrender at the point of salvation does not change the fact that at that time he was given access to “this grace wherein we stand.” Each Christian is given this great inheritance the moment he receives Christ and begins to benefit from it as he accesses it by trusting God to the point of complete surrender. A person is not Spirit-filled and cannot grow in his Christian life without complete surrender. The beginning point of such a life is often a **crisis** of faith, and the growth of that life is not through self-efforts, but is a continuation of faith or a **walk** of faith.

THE WALK OF FAITH

10. What will happen to us when we focus our attention on the glory of God?

II Corinthians 3:18 But **we** all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, **are changed into the same image** from glory to glory, even as by the Spirit of the Lord.

a. _____
Our Attitude – “But we all, with open face”

- 1) “We all” – This changing is available to every Christian who is willing to meet the criteria.
- 2) “with open face” – Picture in your mind a young person with an open face and another with a brash, hard face. The concept of “open face” seems to denote a continued openness to His leadership and an eager expectation of His help.

“It is only as we are ready everyday *without one exception*, to fully live in the obedience to the voice of God and the faith of Jesus, that our life can grow.” – Andrew Murray in *Holiest of All* (pg. 133)

b. Our Action – “beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord”

The word “glory” means “brilliant light.” No human can look at God’s glory and live because His glory is so bright. God has diffused His glory to us in this world through the prism of time. We will never see the full glory of God’s face until we get to Heaven, but we can see Him through “mirrors” in this life:

- 1) In the Bible
- 2) In other Spirit-filled Christians
- 3) In Spirit-filled preaching
- 4) In God's controlling hand through the circumstances of life

A man doesn't gaze into his wife's face to memorize her features, but to enjoy her beauty. Neither do we read our Bibles to obtain facts regarding Him, but simply to behold and appreciate the beauty of His holiness. Will you begin to focus your attention on the glory of God in your life?

- c. Our Alteration – “are changed into the same image from glory to glory”

Notice it does not say that we change ourselves, but that we are changed. This is a continual process of being changed. The Greek word translated “changed” is the origin of our word “metamorphosis.” God's desire is to change us progressively and thoroughly from the inside out. This is the same Greek word that is translated “transformed” in Romans 12:2.

- d. Our Agent – “even as by the Spirit of the Lord”

As long as we are looking to the Lord in surrendered dependence, God's Holy Spirit, who lives in us, continues to do His changing work to our life.

11. How does God promise to give us the ability to say no to our lusts?

Galatians 5:16 This I say then, **Walk in the Spirit**, and you shall not fulfill the lust of the flesh.

One might ask, “How do I walk in the Spirit?” Walking is nothing more than a series of reiterated steps. Walking in the Spirit is simply taking one spiritual step after another. Trusting Christ to save you from sin and Hell was a step of faith. You knew you could not save yourself. You knew He died in your place and would save you if you chose to depend on Him alone for salvation. Now you can walk in the Spirit the same way. Every time you need to make a decision or need strength to do right, simply look to Him in dependence and He will give you the grace you need for the occasion. “As you have therefore received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk in Him” (Colossians 2:6).

This process may not be exactly what you think it is. Many people think His strength in us makes us inherently strong when we depend on Him. The reality is that our flesh stays with us until the day we go to live with Jesus forever in Heaven. What He promises to give us is not *inherent power*, but *counteracting power*. Remember when we likened the law of sin to the law of gravity - neither will go away. Remember too, that we likened the promised victory in Christ to the counteracting potential of a hot air balloon. As long as I am safe in the basket of a hot air balloon, I can rise to amazing heights without any danger from the effects of gravity. God does not *remove* the effects of our flesh. He simply gives us power to *counteract* those effects by keeping our trust focused on Him.

12. Numbers 21:6-9 gives us an illustration of God’s counteracting power and how it works. The Bible teaches us that God’s people were plagued by snakes that were killing the people.

Numbers 21:7-9 Therefore the people came to Moses, and said, ... pray unto the Lord, that **He take away the serpents from us**. And Moses prayed for the people. And the Lord said unto Moses, Make a fiery serpent, and set it upon a pole: and it shall come to pass, that every one that is bitten, when he looks upon it, shall live. And Moses made a serpent of brass, and put it upon a pole, and it came to pass, that if a serpent had bitten any man, when he beheld the serpent of brass, he lived.

➤ What did the people want God to do?

➤ Did God provide for the safety of the people?

➤ Was it what the people asked for?

He didn’t get rid of the snakes. He gave them an *antidote* for the snakes’ power over the people. When the people chose to depend on the truth of God’s promise to keep them from the power of a serpent bite and looked at the brass serpent in faith, a tangible, but invisible power was given to them for health. This is what He is promising you. In John 3:14 Jesus likens Himself to this serpent in the wilderness. It doesn’t “make sense” to our material mind set, but **God dispenses victory through grace to anyone who will simply choose to believe His promises and look to Him in faith for the victory.**

13. The Christian life is compared to running a marathon. God asks three things of us in order to help us run with endurance. What are they?

Hebrews 12:1-2 Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, **let us lay aside every weight, and the sin** which does so easily beset us, and **let us run with patience** the race that is set before us, **looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our** faith; who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God.

➤ Weight - things that are not necessarily wrong but hinder our progress

➤ Patience - continual dependence, not self-struggle

➤ Looking - fixing your eyes steadfastly upon

Who initiates and completes our faith?

14. Write your understanding of one of the following illustrations and how it applies to your life. (Feel free to look back at your notes.)

➤ The Pull of Gravity and the Counteraction of a Hot Air Balloon

➤ The Condition of Myopia and the Counteraction of Corrective Lenses

➤ The Tendency of a Dark Room and the Counteraction of a Bright Light

- In each illustration, what happens when a person stops depending on the counteracting power?

We enter the Spirit-filled life when we choose to invite Jesus to rule as Lord in our life and depend on His power to live victoriously. It grows and is consistently maintained as long as we continue in surrendered dependence. The Christian walk is not one of struggling to succeed, but resting in His proffered grace.

Matthew 11:28-30 Come unto me, all you that labor and are heavy laden, and **I will give you rest.** Take My yoke upon you, and learn of Me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and you shall find rest unto your souls. For **My yoke is easy, and My burden is light.**

APPLICATION

James 1:22-25 promises God's special blessing on those who take action on what His Word teaches.

In this lesson you have seen that sin is damaging to the Christian life and we have no ability to overcome its overwhelming control by our own self-efforts. The counteraction found in the Lord is your only hope. It is not a matter of trying hard to focus on Him. It is a matter of depending upon the facts and not allowing yourself to be deceived by "the **deceitfulness of sin.**" If you have a sin that is between you and the Lord, will you confess it right now? Are there any "weights" that the Lord has burdened your heart about? Again, it is not a matter of pleading for victory, but of resting on the victory already provided. There is no other. Will you continue depending on Him for victory today and forever?

In the space below write your resolve in the form of a prayer.

Caution: It is possible to become too introspective and look for a sin problem every time you “feel” guilty or “sense” that something is wrong with your relationship with God. The Bible teaches that Satan is a deceiver and the accuser of the brethren, and he has the ability to deceive Christians in this area. One way to tell the difference between the confusion of the devil and the conviction of the Holy Spirit is to identify the type of conviction you are experiencing. The Holy Spirit deals with us in a specific manner so that we know exactly what the problem is and exactly what we need to do. Confession of that kind of sin gives immediate relief and restoration of His love, joy, peace, etc. The devil’s false conviction is often a general feeling of guilt and uneasiness. Some experience guilt concerning something in the past that has already been confessed. Confession of that kind of “sin” gives no relief and never can. (How to defeat the devil will be further discussed in Lesson 8.)

How to live as a Spirit-filled Christian in a sinful world

By now you have discovered that life is different than it was before you became a Christian. This lesson is about the changes you can expect and how to understand and adjust to those changes.

UNDERSTANDING THE INTERNAL CHANGE

1. How does God expect believers to walk?

Ephesians 2:8-10 For by grace are you saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: not of works, lest any man should boast. For **we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works**, which **God** has before **ordained that we should walk in them**.

2. Find the five ways Spirit-filled Christians should walk, and circle them.

Ephesians 4:1 I ... beseech you that you walk worthy of the vocation wherewith you are called.

Ephesians 4:17 This I say therefore, and testify in the Lord, that you henceforth walk not as other Gentiles walk, in the vanity of their mind.

Ephesians 5:2 And walk in love, as Christ also has loved us, and has given Himself for us an offering and a sacrifice to God for a sweet-smelling savor.

Ephesians 5:8 For you were sometimes darkness, but now are you light in the Lord: walk as children of light.

Ephesians 5:15 See then that you walk circumspectly [watching each step carefully so as not to defile oneself], not as fools, but as wise.

Taking off and putting on a garment is another picture of the Spirit-filled life and your ability to walk differently than your unsaved counterparts.

3. Describe the garment God commands you to take off.

Ephesians 4:22 That you put off concerning the former conversation [lifestyle] **the old man**, which is **corrupt** according to the **deceitful lusts** [desires].

4. What happened to our old man?

Romans 6:6 Knowing this, that **our old man is crucified with Him**, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin.

Your old nature, which could never please God, is dead. However, the residual influence of that old nature still remains in your lifestyle. You have formed patterns of behavior that your flesh is loathe to give up. God wired you for spiritual success, but you must stay connected to your spiritual power source through complete surrender. Saying no to God not only disconnects you from His power, but causes you to draw on your own strength and desires. Picture two drinking cups. If you choose to go your own way, you effectively take your “straw” out of the Spirit and begin drawing on the cup of your flesh. As long as you have your “straw” in the Spirit, you will draw on His power and produce His fruit. The power of the flesh is strong, but it does not control you as your old nature did. You have been freed from its control. Taking off the old man is to consider it crucified with Jesus, choosing not to follow its residual influence on your flesh.

5. Describe the garment God wants you to put on.

Ephesians 4:24 And that you put on **the new man**, which after God is **created in righteousness** and **true holiness**.

Before receiving Christ, your “old man” had complete sway over your soul. You were alive to sin, but dead to Christ. Your “new man” was born in you at the moment of salvation. Until then, there was only one “man” your soul could wear. Your old man could not do anything that pleased God. Even the “plowing of the wicked is sin” (Proverbs 21:4). Your “new” man is your connection to spiritual living. Notice what is said concerning your “new man.” You are made after God, i.e., in His image. Only God is righteous and truly holy. These characteristics are

divine in nature. Therefore, your “new man” is God-like and is perfectly right with God. It is God’s seed in you that cannot sin (1 John 3:9). The “new man” is not the Holy Spirit, but is **born** of the Spirit and **empowered** by the Spirit. What satisfies God, satisfies your new man. Never forget - **this “new man” is the new you**, recreated in God’s image. The reason you loathe the sin you still commit from time to time is because it conflicts with your new nature.

Every new Christian has had this experience. Perhaps you recall doing something that was part of your old life. You may remember that horrible feeling of wondering, “What is wrong with me?” and feeling like a horrible failure. That was a wonderful moment! Your new nature was making its debut in its life-long pursuit of transforming your life into the image of Christ.

6. What must you be convinced is true about you?

Romans 6:11 Likewise **reckon** you also **yourselves to be dead indeed unto sin**, but **alive unto God** through Jesus Christ our Lord.

As death to the old man is a disconnection from its controlling power, so being alive to God is connecting to His enabling power. When you trusted Christ to save you, He realigned your relationship with spiritual life and death. You were once connected to sin and death, with no ability to break free. Now you are connected to God and His holy life.

7. If one nature is “old” and one is “new,” and if one is “dead” and the other is “born again,” which nature characterizes who you are now that you are in Christ?

8. Did God give you new desires when He realigned your life?

II Corinthians 5:17 Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, **all things are become new**.

Lesson 8: The Holy Spirit & My Changing Life

9. Describe the residual patterns and desires your crucified “old man” left in your flesh.

Ephesians 4:22 That you put off concerning the former conversation the old man, which is corrupt according to the **deceitful** lusts [desires].

The flesh is still able to deceive you into giving place to old desires. The word translated “lust” from the original language is closely related to the modern word “thermos.” The picture is of insulating and inflaming an ungodly thought or desire until it catches fire and burns us.

10. What happens when an ungodly thought or desire is inflamed? _____

What follows? _____

James 1:15 Then when lust has conceived, it **brings forth sin**: and sin, when it is finished, **brings forth death**.

One could call this the **LSD** principle. **L**ust, when it is insulated and inflamed, produces **S**in. This is not something that **might** happen when you give in to lust, but something that **will** happen every time. Sin always brings **D**eath back into your life. This death is not cessation of spiritual life, but separation from its power. When you sin, you have ceased to allow the Holy Spirit to control every thought and action and cannot be filled with the Spirit until you deal with your sin. You must put off the influence of the old man before the energizing power of the new man can be revived. (Ephesians 4:22-24)

This cannot be done through self-effort, but must be the work of Jesus, accessed by genuine confession of sin (1 John 1:9). This is important to note: sin does not change our standing with God. In fact, God likens our relationship with Him to the relationship of an earthly father and His sometimes-disobedient child. The sin of a Christian does not take him out of *favor* with God, but out of *fellowship* with Him.

11. What should a disobedient Christian expect?

Hebrews 12:6-7 For whom the Lord loves **He chastens**, and scourges **every son** whom He receives. ... **God deals with you as with sons**; for what son is he whom the father chastens not?

12. Why does He chastise us?

Hebrews 12:10 For they [earthly fathers] verily for a few days chastened us after their own pleasure; but He [chastens us] **for our profit, that we might be partakers of His holiness.**

Though you are still His child, sin changes your fellowship with Him. When you choose to disobey, you are taking back control of your own life. You have decided that you know better than God.

13. Do you remember what happens to those who are proud?

James 4:6b **God resists the proud**, but gives grace unto the humble.

When you have said “no” to God, you take your life off the altar of complete sacrifice. He can no longer give you His enabling grace. You will be stuck in a pattern of spiritual battle against God, with no ability to do anything that pleases Him until you rid yourself of rebellion and look to Him to re-establish His grace in your life.

This destructive pattern comes from **deceitful** lusts. The realigning that Christ did in us at the point of salvation gave us a new nature that takes no pleasure in sin. It certainly doesn't satisfy. Then why do we go back to sin? The problem is that we are deceived.

14. Since the problem is **deceit**, the answer lies in the **truth**. What did Jesus say about the truth?

John 8:32 And you shall know the truth, and **the truth shall make you free.**

Thus far, we have discussed the patterning of our flesh with the “old man” and the energizing ability of the “new man.” The fact that we are required to make a choice between the two indicates another part exists that has the ability to

choose. That other part is our Soul, often described as our mind, emotions and will. These are stated in this order due to logical sequence. First, you think about what you should or should not do; then you set your affections one way or the other; and finally, you most often choose that way for which your affections have been cast.

15. What does God tell us to do with our mind?

Ephesians 4:23 And **be renewed in the spirit of your mind.**

16. What kind of mind do you have now that you are saved?

II Timothy 1:7 For **God has** not **given us the spirit** of fear; but of power, and of love, and **of a sound mind.**

To have the victory the Lord provides, you must personally reckon these statements to be true and choose to depend on them. This is the way you use the truth of God's Word to give you freedom from the deceitful influence of the "old man."

17. What does the Word of God do when you allow it to become your way of thinking?

James 1:21 Wherefore lay apart all filthiness and superfluity [abundance] of naughtiness, and receive with meekness the engrafted word, **which is able to save your souls.**

There are times for all of us when the troubles of life and heartaches of soul wear us down. During those times, you will be vulnerable to sin's attack. There may be times you don't seem to be able to think right about sin and victory. The problem might be you have a sick soul. No one feels good when they're sick. When you go to a doctor who discovers the problem and prescribes the right medicine, feeling good never felt so good. The right medicine for a sick soul is the Word of God. Allowing the Holy Spirit to use the Bible to center your mind on Christ is the need of your heart.

Hebrews 12:3 For consider Him that endured such contradiction of sinners against Himself, lest you be wearied [sick] and faint [let go] in your minds.

18. What kind of weaponry has God provided for the Christian?

II Corinthians 10:3-4 For though we walk in the flesh, we do not war after [in the ability of] the flesh: (**for the weapons of our warfare are** not carnal [fleshly], but **mighty** [supernatural] **through God** to the pulling down of strong holds).

19. What will the Holy Spirit enable us to do?

II Corinthians 10:5 Casting down imaginations, and every high thing that exalts itself against the knowledge of God, and **bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ.**

20. Once your thinking is right, what will God enable you to do with your affections?

Colossians 3:2 **Set your affection on things above**, not on things on the earth.

21. Who can you count on to give you the willpower to do right?

Philippians 2:13 For it is God which works in you **both to will and to do of His good pleasure.**

UNDERSTANDING THE EXTERNAL AND INTERNAL ENEMIES

If deception is the problem, who or what is doing the deceiving? The Bible teaches that we have three enemies constantly pulling at us to do wrong: our flesh, the

world and the Devil. We dealt with the first two in other lessons. Now we will meet the third enemy, the power behind the other two.

22. Your primary enemy is an invisible spirit, nevertheless, a real person. What is his name? _____

1 Peter 5:8 Be sober, be vigilant; because **your adversary the devil**, as a roaring lion, walks about, seeking whom he may devour.

23. What two terms describe his character and indicate his methods?

John 8:44 ... the devil ... was **a murderer** from the beginning, and abode not in the truth, because there is no truth in him. When he speaks a lie, he speaks of his own: for he is **a liar**, and the father of it.

The Devil is a murderer and a liar, and he deceives and kills.

24. The Devil is also called Satan and is often referred to in the Bible as the serpent. What was the Scripture writer concerned Satan would do to believers?

II Corinthians 11:3 But I fear, lest by any means, as the serpent beguiled [deceived] Eve through his subtlety, **so your minds should be corrupted from the simplicity that is in Christ.**

UNDERSTANDING THE PERSON OF VICTORY

25. What is the key to running the marathon God set before you?

Hebrews 12:1-2 ...let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which does so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us, **looking unto Jesus** the author and finisher of our faith; Who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God.

The victorious Christ life is simple. Keep your eyes focused on Jesus, who is the answer to transformed living.

26. What does God promise to those who are tempted?

I Corinthians 10:13 There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man: but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that you are able; but will with the temptation also make **a way to escape, that you may be able to bear it.**

27. How can you avoid temptations?

Romans 13:14 But **put on the Lord Jesus Christ**, and **make not provision for the flesh**, to fulfill the lusts thereof.

UNDERSTANDING THE LIFE OF VICTORY

28. What two attributes characterize the “new man”?

Ephesians 4:24 And that you put on the new man, which after God is created in **righteousness** and true **holiness**.

Righteousness is perfectly fulfilling God’s law; holiness is separateness from sin. Only God is holy, but in the “new man” He has given us the ability to live in **His** holiness.

29. To what extent does God intend your new life to be holy?

I Peter 1:15 But as He which hath called you is holy, so be you holy **in all manner of conversation [lifestyle]**.

30. What promise is given to those who decide to obey God by separating from evil?

II Corinthians 6:14-17 Be not unequally yoked together with unbelievers: for what fellowship has righteousness with unrighteousness? and what communion has light with darkness? And what concord has Christ with Belial [the devil]? or what part has he that believeth with an infidel? And what agreement has the temple of God with idols? for you are the temple of the living God; as God hath said, **I will dwell in them, and walk in them; and I will be their God, and they shall be My people.** Wherefore come out from among them, and be separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and **I will receive you,**

Consider how important it is for a doctor to wear gloves to prevent contamination. He could ignore the obvious dangers, or he could stay away from danger by not caring for people at all. He chooses, however, to both care for the needs of his patients and avoid contamination by wearing protective gloves. The world we live in is a sinful place that is hostile to Spirit-filled living, yet it is filled with many needy people. Obviously, God's plan is not to completely withdraw from the world. His will for us is to live in this world, helping sinful men, all the while protecting ourselves by separating from sin through the promised power of the Holy Spirit.

James 1:22 But **be doers** of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves.

James 1:22-25 promises God's special blessing on those who take action on what His Word teaches.

How to access God's Throne of Grace

Prayer is one of God's greatest inheritance gifts. Jesus taught that we could literally move mountains through prayer. Through the ages, men of God have accomplished through prayer what never could have been done without it. God desires that every one of His children come to Him in prayer. Prayer is asking of God and receiving from Him. It leads to God-dependent living rather than self-dependence. Prayer can stop our natural bent to trust in our own thinking and abilities to meet our needs and leads us to let God direct our lives and provide for us. In this lesson we will look at the definition and description of prayer, confirm the importance of prayer, deal with hindrances to prayer and learn how to pray.

WHAT IS PRAYER?

The Christian life is not religious acts or personal performances. It is a dynamic, intimate relationship with God. Communication is the most vital need of a growing relationship. God speaks to us as we read and study our Bibles, listen to preaching, etc. Prayer is talking to God and is essential for living in a close relationship with Him.

Prayer is not just a ceremony we memorize and perform. It is a lifeline in the communication chain we share with God. Our primary relationship with God is a receiving relationship. Prayer is not a duty; it is a gift. Prayer is the means by which God implements His provision.

I. What does God invite us to do? _____
Why? _____

I Peter 5:7 Casting all your care upon Him; for He cares for you.

God already knows all that is in your heart but invites you to open your heart to Him and give Him your burdens. He loves drawing you close in this way, making your relationship with Him dynamic and intimate. What an awesome gift that we unworthy souls are invited to be close to Deity!

Prayer also includes listening to God. In this lesson you will learn the importance of praying in the will of God. One of the most wonderful aspects of our communion with the Holy Spirit is that He communicates to us, thereby allowing us to align ourselves with His will and actually participate in bringing it about.

2. Jesus taught His disciples about prayer by teaching them the Lord's Prayer.

Matthew 6:9b-10 Our Father which art in heaven, Hallowed be thy name.
Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in
heaven.

➤ Where does God's will originate?

➤ How do we get God's will down to earth?

3. Who are we in our relationship with Jesus?

Romans 8:16-17 The Spirit itself bears witness with our spirit, that we are
the children of God: And if children, then heirs; **heirs of
God**, and **joint-heirs with Christ**.

During Jesus' earthly ministry, He spent many hours talking to His Father and receiving comfort and guidance from Him. As God's heirs, one of our inheritance rights is the privilege to talk to Him and have Him meet our needs through prayer.

4. What does this verse tell us about the ministry of prayer for today?

John 16:26-27 At that day you shall ask in My name: and I say not unto you,
that I will pray the Father for you: For the **Father Himself
loves you**, because you have loved Me, and have believed
that I came out from God.

In His teaching ministry Jesus painted a picture of prayer by describing a loving father's provision for his impatient, hungry child. He began with a wonderful invitation and promise.

Luke 11:9 And I say unto you, Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and
ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you.

Notice that He emphasized the teaching by saying that **every one** who asks, receives, etc.

Luke 11:10 For every one that asks receives; and he that seeks finds; and to him that knocks it shall be opened.

The listeners who had traveled many miles on foot in the surrounding wilderness better understood the following statements:

Luke 11:11-13 If a son shall ask bread of any of you that is a father, will he give him a stone? or if he ask a fish, will he for a fish give him a serpent? Or if he shall ask an egg, will he offer him a scorpion? If ye then, being evil, know how to give good gifts unto your children, how much more shall your heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to them that ask him?

Jesus asked the fathers which of them would give a stone to his hungry son who was asking for bread. The connection between the two seemingly unconnected items would be immediate for those who had seen the stones beside the road that looked exactly like a loaf of bread, the serpent moving in the water as a fish or the scorpion rolled up to look like an egg. No father would give his impatient, hungry little one the stone that the child, in his immaturity, thought was a loaf of bread. The father would remind his child that he must wait until something appropriate to eat was available. He loved his son; so, of course he would feed him.

Luke 11:13 ... how much more shall your heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to them that ask him?

Jesus made it very clear that God is your heavenly Father and that He most certainly will give you the working power of the Holy Spirit for specific needs when you ask for it. **God does answer your prayers.** However, He loves you enough not to give you “the rock” you asked for but will surely give you “the bread” you need.

5. What are the two words repeated in each of these verses?

Matthew 7:8 For every one that **asks receives**; and he that seeks finds; and to him that knocks it shall be opened.

Matthew 21:22 And all things, whatsoever ye shall **ask** in prayer, believing, ye shall **receive**.

1 John 3:22	And whatsoever we ask , we receive of him, because we keep his commandments, and do those things that are pleasing in his sight.

➤ Do you get the idea that when we ask for something from God we should expect to receive it? _____

A great book on prayer entitled *Asking and Receiving* reminds us that prayer is more than just asking God for things. Biblical prayer is asking **and receiving**.

6. What spiritual place do we enter when we pray?

Hebrews 4:16 Let us therefore come boldly **unto the throne of grace**, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need.

Prayer is communication with God that accomplishes God's heavenly plans for our lives here on earth. It is drawing close to Him and trusting Him as a loving Father. Prayer is not complete when we are finished asking; it is complete when we see God answer our prayer. We are children of the King, and He has invited us into His very throne room to seek His amazing grace and marvelous mercy every time we need Him. And we need Him all the time.

THE IMPORTANCE OF PRAYER

7. Ephesians 6:12-19 deals with our spiritual warfare. Notice the "alls" in this verse. In your own words record the importance prayer plays in securing victory over the enemy.

Ephesians 6:18 Praying **always** with **all prayer** and **supplication** in the Spirit, and watching thereunto with **all perseverance** and supplication for **all** saints.

8. Prayer is God's appointed way of obtaining what we need. What happens when we don't pray?

James 4:2 You ... desire to have, and cannot obtain ... yet **you have not, because you ask not.**

9. When the early church had a problem, too many responsibilities and too few workers, how did the apostles view the importance of prayer?

Acts 6:4 But **we will give ourselves continually to prayer**, and to the ministry of the word.

10. The word "prayer" is used over 25 times in conjunction with Jesus' earthly ministry. Record the time of day Jesus is seen praying.

Mark 1:35 And **in the morning**, rising up **a great while before day**, he went out, and departed into a solitary place, and there prayed.

Luke 6:12 And it came to pass in those days, that he went out into a mountain to pray, and **continued all night in prayer** to God.

Prayer is also important in our lives because it promotes spiritual growth!

11. In the beginning of this Psalm, David praised the Lord for knowing Him thoroughly. What does he ask God to do to help his walk with God?

Psalm 139:23-24 **Search me**, O God, and know my heart: **try me**, and know my thoughts: And **see if there be any wicked way in me**, and **lead me in the way everlasting.**

12. What else is available through prayer?

Psalm 51:7 **Purge me** with hyssop, and **I shall be clean: wash me,**
and **I shall be whiter than snow.**

13. What is God willing to do in response to prayer?

Psalm 119:18 **Open** Thou **mine eyes**, that I may behold wondrous
things out of thy law.

James 1:5 If any of you lack **wisdom**, let him ask of God, that gives
to all men liberally, and upbraids not; and it **shall be given**
him.

14. Please note the areas of growth mentioned in these verses.

John 16:24 Hitherto have ye asked nothing in my name: ask, and ye
shall receive, that your **joy** may be full.

Philippians 4:6 Be careful [**anxious**] for nothing; but in every thing by
prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests
be made known unto God.

Luke 11:13 If ye then, being evil, know how to give good gifts unto your
children: how much more shall **your** heavenly Father give
the **Holy Spirit** [power] to them that ask him?

Luke 21:34, 36 And take heed to yourselves, lest at any time your hearts
be overcharged with surfeiting [pre-drunkeness], and
drunkenness, and cares of this life.... Watch ye therefore,
and pray always, that ye may be accounted worthy to
escape all these things that shall come to pass, and to
stand before the Son of Man.

HOW TO PRAY

15. Though many enjoy praying the Lord's Prayer as a memorized prayer, it was actually given as a model by which to construct our own personal prayers to God.

Notice the different parts of the prayer, and in your own words title each section.

Matthew 6:9-13

After this manner therefore pray ye: Our Father which art in heaven.

Hallowed be thy name.

Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our debts,

As we forgive our debtors.

And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil:

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever. Amen.

Following are the titles given each section. Use this as a model to write your own sample prayer.

Address God and recognize His Sovereignty over your life.

Praise Him as God.

Pray to know and do the will of God.

Pray for personal and practical needs.

Confess any unconfessed sins. (If you can't think of any, ask God to reveal the sins that He wants you to confess.)

Pray a prayer of forgiveness concerning anyone who has wronged you. (If the situation is known to the person you are praying for, you may need to forgive him directly.)

Pray for spiritual power and for victory over sin.

Praise and adore God. (Jesus begins and ends this model prayer with praise. Praise is a great way to prepare your heart in prayer, but you will find that your praise is more vibrant and your worship more personal as you end your prayer with praise.)

In the late 18th century George Müller, a great man of prayer, started and ran several orphanages. The following is an excerpt from a biography by J. Gilchrist Lawson < www.wholesomewords.org >.

Among the greatest monuments of what can be accomplished through simple faith in God are the great orphanages covering thirteen acres of ground on Ashley Downs, Bristol, England. When God put it into the heart of George Müller to build these orphanages, he had only two shillings (50 cents) in his pocket. Without making his wants known to any man, but to God alone,

over a million, four hundred thousand pounds (\$7,000,000.00) were sent to him for the building and maintaining of these orphan homes. When [Lawson] first visited them, near the time of Mr. Müller's death, there were five immense buildings of solid granite, capable of accommodating two thousand orphans. In all the years since the first orphans arrived, the Lord had sent food in due time so that they had never missed a meal for want of food.

Müller purposed to give the church a working picture of the power of God demonstrated by simply praying. When funds were low he would often spend the night in prayer, looking for a specific promise in the Word of God to claim and expect God to keep.

16. This was one of Müller's favorite verses. Can you think of anything you should pray for based on this promise?

Psalm 81:10 I am the LORD thy God, which brought thee out of the land of Egypt: open thy mouth wide, and I will fill it.

17. Can you think of any other promises from the Word of God you can take to the Lord? Record them in the space below. If you can't think of any, ask God to show you some as you read your Bible over the next several days.

Hosea 14:2 Take with you words, and turn to the LORD.

I like to call this "praying the promises." Promises from God are invitations to pray. Through these promises God is telling us what He wants to do, and is, in effect, inviting us to be the prayer channels by which He can accomplish His will here on earth.

18. How can we have confidence that God is hearing us and will answer our prayer?

1 John 5:14,15

And this is the confidence that we have in Him, that, if we **ask** any thing **according to His will**, He hears us: And if we know that He hear us, whatsoever we ask, we know that we have the petitions that we desired of Him.

The next logical question is, how can we know what God's will is? The Bible is the complete, authoritative revelation of God's person and truth to man. It is all we need to know about Who God is, who we are, and how to have a right relationship with Him - including what He wants to do in our lives. R.A. Torrey once said, "If we would feed the fire of our prayers with the fuel of God's Word, all of our difficulties in prayer would disappear."

The Bible teaches us God's will in all the general areas of life; but there are other specific areas, unique to your life, that He also wants to show you.

19. Who lives in you now that you are a Christian?

Romans 8:11

But if the **Spirit of Him** that raised up Jesus from the dead **dwell in you**, He that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken [give life to] your mortal bodies by His Spirit that dwells in you.

20. How does the Holy Spirit communicate to us that we are adopted into God's family and that we should cry out to Him as our intimate Father?

Romans 8:14-16

For as many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God. For you have not received the spirit of bondage again to fear; but you have received **the Spirit** of adoption, **whereby we cry, Abba, Father. The Spirit** itself **bears witness with our spirit**, that we are the children of God:

This terminology indicates that the Holy Spirit is issuing a joint statement with your regenerated spirit that you are the child of God, and when your soul is in tune with Him, it is stirred to intimately cry out to your heavenly Father. When my wife and I were in Israel we visited the headwaters of the Jordan River. It was a holiday, and the natural pool of water was filled with Israeli children splashing and playing in the heat of the day. The hum of a foreign language filled our ears, but one word of recognition clearly rang out as the children cried over and over, “Abba, Abba.” It brought tears to our eyes as we recognized the familiar intimacy of that word to those happy children. The blessed Holy Spirit creates a longing for intimacy with our heavenly Father and stirs our hearts to cry out to Him.

21. Does God know that we don’t always know what we should pray?

Romans 8:26-27 Likewise the Spirit also helps our infirmities [weaknesses]: for **we know not what we should pray** for as we ought: but the Spirit itself makes intercession for us with groanings which cannot be uttered. And He that searches the hearts knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because He makes intercession for the saints according to the will of God.

➤ What kind of communication does the Holy Spirit use when He tells us how to pray?

... but the Spirit itself makes intercession for us with **groanings which cannot be uttered.**

➤ When the Holy Spirit prays, He prays in us, and in so doing, He prompts us to pray. What does the Holy Spirit know and prompt us to pray?

And He [God] that searches the hearts knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because He [the Holy Spirit] makes intercession for the saints according to **the will of God.**

Throughout God’s word He communicated with men through a variety of methods. Sometimes He sent an angel. Once He spoke through a burning bush. He often used dreams. But two things were true about each instance of communication.

- #1 The person knew it was God talking to him.
- #2 He knew what God had said.

Scripture indicates that after God gave us the completed Bible, His revelation was complete; and we should no longer expect Him to continue using sensational signs to communicate with us. He continues to speak to our hearts and reveal His will through the Holy Spirit. Though we will not hear words, we can still expect the same two things to be true in His communication with us.

- #1 We can know it is God communicating with us.
- #2 We can know what He is saying.

22. How does God answer our prayers?

Romans 8:32 He that spared not **His own Son**, but delivered Him up for us all, how shall he not **with Him** also **freely give us all things**?

23. What does it mean to pray in Jesus' name?

John 14:13,14 And whatsoever ye shall ask **in my name**, that will I do, that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If ye shall ask any thing **in my name**, I will do it.

I often conclude my prayers by saying, "In Jesus' name I pray, Amen." This is not simply a formality of prayer, but a recognition that the only ground I have to stand on in the throne room of God is the ground purchased for me by my exchanged life in Jesus. When we pray in Jesus' name we are acknowledging our own unworthiness, and we are also claiming "Christ in us" as our right to call upon God.

If I went into a bank, showed my identification and asked for money, the teller would say to me, "I'm sorry. You have no money in this bank." If I took in a check made out to me, signed by one of their customers, it wouldn't matter that I had no money in that bank. It would only matter that the man whose name was on the bottom of the check had enough money to cover the check.

When we pray in Jesus' name, we are not hoping we have been good enough to merit God's favor so that He will answer our prayer. We come in the name of Jesus. He has promised to supply our every need, and He is good for the promise.

R.A. Torrey also taught, "Don't give up praying until you get what you are asking for, or until God makes it very clear that it is not His will to give it. How often

do we get right up to the verge of a great blessing in prayer and just then let go? God often uses the time between our request and His answer to build our faith, but only if we persist in prayer.

24. What did the Cannanite woman do to demonstrate she had great faith?

Matthew 15:22-28 And, behold, a woman of Canaan came out of the same coasts, and **cried unto him** [Jesus], saying, Have mercy on me, O Lord, thou Son of David; my daughter is grievously vexed with a devil. But he answered her not a word. And his disciples came and besought him, saying, Send her away; for **she crieth after us**. But he answered and said, I am not sent but unto the lost sheep of the house of Israel. **Then came she and worshipped him, saying,** Lord, help me. But he answered and said, It is not meet to take the children's bread, and to cast it to dogs. **And she said,** Truth, Lord: yet the dogs eat of the crumbs which fall from their masters' table. Then Jesus answered and said unto her, O woman, great is thy faith: be it unto thee even as thou wilt. And her daughter was made whole from that very hour.

25. If we persist in prayer, what does God promise He will do?

Luke 18:1-8 And He [Jesus] spoke a parable unto them to this end, that men ought always to pray, and not to faint; Saying, There was in a city a judge, which feared not God, neither regarded man: And there was a widow in that city; and she came unto him, saying, Avenge me of mine adversary. And he would not for a while: but afterward he said within himself, Though I fear not God, nor regard man; Yet because this widow troubles me, I will avenge her, lest by her continual coming she weary me. And the Lord said, Hear what the unjust judge said. And shall not God avenge **His own elect, which cry day and night unto Him**, though He bear long with them? I tell you that **He will avenge them speedily**. Nevertheless when the Son of man cometh, shall he find **faith** on the earth?

- When Jesus comes back to earth, what will He be looking for from His children?

By praying for our needs and persisting in prayer, we demonstrate our faith.

HINDRANCES TO PRAYER

We have all of these promises about praying, persisting and always receiving. Then why aren't we seeing more of our prayers answered?

26. What missing ingredient leads to unanswered prayer?

James 1:6-7

But let him **ask in faith**, nothing wavering. For **he that wavers** is like a wave of the sea driven with the wind and tossed. For **let not that man think that he shall receive** any thing of the Lord.

27. Why was God not answering the prayers of these people?

Ezekiel 14:3

Son of man, these men have set up their **idols in their heart**, and put **the stumbling-block of their iniquity** before their face: should I be enquired of at all by them?

- What are some idols of the heart people have today?

28. Why does God say He doesn't give people what they desire?

James 4:2

You ... desire to have, and cannot obtain: ye fight and war, yet ye have not, **because ye ask not.**

- When the same people did pray, why weren't their prayers answered?

James 4:3 You ask, and receive not, because you **ask amiss, that you may consume it upon your lusts.**

29. The way we live can affect our prayer life. What is the hindrance to prayer in this verse?

1 Peter 3:7 Likewise, **husbands**, dwell with *them* according to knowledge, **giving honor unto the wife**, as unto the weaker vessel, and as being heirs together of the grace of life; **that your prayers be not hindered.**

30. What did the psalmist know would hinder his prayers?

Psalm 66:18 If I **regard iniquity** in my heart, the Lord will not hear me:

31. Is anyone sinless?

1 John 1:8 If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us.

Look at # 30 again. It is **regarded sin** that is sure to hinder your walk with God and keep Him from answering your prayers. Remember what causes God to resist a man? – **Pride**

James 4:6 God resists the proud, but gives grace unto the humble.

If you have unconfessed sin in your life, won't you humble yourself right now before God and get right with Him? We must have grace. We can't function in our daily walk, let alone our prayer life, without it.

A PRACTICAL METHOD OF PRAYER

Evangelist Steve Pettit developed this simple pattern of prayer to help you pray thirty minutes a day.

PRAISE (10 Minutes)

REPENT (5 Minutes)

ASK (10 Minutes)

YIELD (5 Minutes)

#10

How to live as a Spirit-filled member of my family

What comes to mind when you think of home? Mom? Apple pie? Front porch? Tension? Bickering? Broken promises? Shattered dreams? We all approach this subject from our own experiences - good or bad. The goal of this lesson is to look at God's ideal and make a plan to move our experience toward His ideal. This, too, is part of your inheritance rights in Christ.

A DESCRIPTION OF THE HOME

If becoming God's child changes anything in our lives for the better, it ought to change our relationship with our own families! II Corinthians 2:14 teaches that God is putting His victory on parade in the Christian's life. He wants to show the world who He is through your life, and the place He wants to begin is in your home.

1. How is being Spirit filled compared to being drunk?

Ephesians 5:18 And be not drunk with wine, wherein is excess; but be filled with the Spirit.

Being Spirit filled is allowing the Holy Spirit to control our every thought and action. Ephesians 5:19-6:10 deals with key areas of our lives that will be affected by the filling of the Holy Spirit. The vast majority of that section teaches how the Holy Spirit influences our relationships within our immediate families. God is an intimate friend who desires to help us in our intimate relationships.

2. Who created the home?

Genesis 2:22-24 And the rib, which **the LORD God** had taken from man, made he a woman, and **brought her unto the man**. And Adam said, This is now bone of my bones, and flesh of my flesh: she shall be called Woman, because she was taken out of Man. Therefore shall a man leave his father and his mother; and shall cleave unto his wife: and they shall be one flesh.

God brought Eve to Adam, and in the sinless environment before the fall of man, He created marriage. This unique phrase, "shall cleave unto his wife and they shall be one flesh" is found in only three other passages of the Bible - twice in the teachings of Jesus (Matthew 19:5-8 & Mark 10:7-9) and once in the Ephesians 5 passage on the home.

The definition of marriage is widely debated in our culture, but from these six passages we derive six basic ingredients of marriage as God designed it.

The 6 Biblical Ingredients of Marriage:

- ① The establishment of a new family group distinct from parental relationships
- ② The willful decision to join two lives into a binding relationship
- ③ The permanent blending of two entities into one for the duration of life
- ④ The initiation of an ongoing physical relationship given by the creator God exercised only within the confines of this unique relationship
- ⑤ The authorization of the marriage from God
- ⑥ The accountability of the marriage from man

Marriage is a covenant relationship in which one man and one woman vow before God in the presence of human witnesses to be faithful to an exclusive partnership that encompasses every area of life for the entire duration of life.

2. What truth did Jesus add to the phrase “shall cleave unto his wife and they shall be one flesh”?

Matthew 19:5-6 And said, For this cause shall a man leave father and mother, and shall cleave to his wife: and they twain shall be one flesh? Wherefore they are no more twain, but one flesh. **What therefore God hath joined together, let not man put asunder.**

Mark 10:7-9 For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother, and cleave to his wife; And they twain shall be one flesh: so then they are no more twain, but one flesh. **What therefore God hath joined together, let not man put asunder.**

In Genesis 2 before man sinned, it was not necessary for God to teach us not to leave our marriages. All of the unkindness and iniquities found in marriages today are due to man’s sinful condition. Remember, Christ’s exchange with you has given you the freedom to live His life of victory over sin and its effects. He wants to give you a marriage that exemplifies the fruit of the Holy Spirit - love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance (Galatians 5:22-23).

3. What is added to the definition of marriage found in this passage dealing with Spirit-filled living in our homes?

Ephesians 5:31-32 For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother; and shall be joined unto his wife, and they two shall be one flesh. **This is a great mystery: but I speak concerning Christ and the church.**

The marriage of Christ to the church is a real event that is going to take place in Heaven. Many think of Heaven as a distant, mystical place, far from their minds.

4. Does God want heaven to be far from our minds?

Colossians 3:2 **Set your affection on things above**, not on things on the earth.

God wants us to have an eternal perspective in each area of life. In fact, He wants to illustrate Heaven to others living here on earth through the earthly marriages of His children. You have probably heard the phrase, "a little bit of Heaven here on earth." This is literally what God had in mind when he designed the home.

5. What is the key to building a successful home?

Psalms 127:1 **Except the LORD build the house**, they labor in vain that build it: except the LORD keep the city, the watchman wakes but in vain.

ROLES IN THE HOME

If you are to succeed in making your home the refuge and place of beauty God wants it to be, you must have the ingredients God prescribes for godly marriages.

The first ingredient for a godly marriage is a godly husband.

Husband

6. Who has authority over the husband?

I Corinthians 11:3 But I would have you know, that **the head of every man is Christ**; and the head of the woman is the man; and the head of Christ is God.

7. What is the husband's role in the home?

Ephesians 5:23-24 For **the husband is the head** of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church: and he is the saviour of the body. Therefore as the church is subject unto Christ, so let the wives be to their own husbands in every thing.

8. What are husbands commanded to do?

Ephesians 5:25-29 **Husbands, love your wives**, even as Christ also loved the church, and gave Himself for it; That He might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the Word, That He might present it to Himself a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish. So ought men to love their wives as their own bodies. He that loves his wife loves himself. For no man ever yet hated his own flesh; but **nourishes** and **cherishes** it, even as the Lord the church.

➤ To what extent is the husband to love his wife?

Husbands, love your wives, even **as Christ also loved** the church.

➤ What does this kind of love demand?

Christ also loved the church, and **gave Himself** for it.

➤ What motive should drive a godly husband?

So ought men to love their wives as their own bodies. He that loves his wife loves himself. For no man ever yet hated his own flesh; but **nourishes** and **cherishes** it, even as the Lord the church.

The motive of a godly husband's love must be selfless, aimed at the edification and blessing of his wife.

- What two verbs does God use to describe the love a godly husband should have for his wife? What do these words mean to you?

9. In Proverbs 5:15-21 God describes His plan for intimacy within the marriage. Look this up in your Bible and read it. In the middle of the passage He gives these commands:

... rejoice with the wife of your youth

... be ravished always with her love

- Do these commands demand a decision? What is it?

10. The Song of Solomon is an entire book of the Old Testament devoted to intimacy in marriage. How does this husband verbalize his choice to delight in his wife?

Song of Solomon 4:9 You have ravished my heart, my sister, my spouse; you have ravished my heart with one of your eyes, with one chain of your neck.

11. What does it mean for a husband to live with his wife according to knowledge?

1 Peter 3:7 ... husbands, dwell with them according to knowledge, giving honor unto the wife, as unto the weaker vessel, and as being heirs together of the grace of life; that your prayers be not hindered.

- In what ways can a husband honor his wife?

- Describe the significance of being equal heirs of our inheritance in Christ?

Malachi 2 speaks of the wife of your youth, your companion, and the wife of your covenant. A godly husband must choose to cherish and delight in his wife, counting her as precious. When a husband lives this way, he is creating “a little bit of heaven on earth” in his home. A wife who experiences this kind of love from her husband will not be afraid to fulfill her God-given role in the home.

The second ingredient of a godly marriage is a godly wife.

Wife

12. Who has the authority over the wife?

Ephesians 5:23

For **the husband is the head of the wife**, even as Christ is the head of the church; and he is the savior of the body.

Remember who has authority over the husband. When a wife chooses to live under her husband’s authority, she is living under God’s authority.

13. What are wives commanded to do?

Ephesians 5:22

Wives, submit yourselves unto your own husbands, as unto the Lord.

14. Why did God create a wife for Adam?

Genesis 2:18

And the LORD God said, It is not good that the man should be alone; I will **make him an help meet for him**.

The word “meet” means “suitable,” or “one that fits his needs.” She was given to him as a helper who was made especially for him to meet his specific needs. Another way of understanding Eve’s role is that she was created as Adam’s **completer**. God ended every day of creation by pronouncing each thing he made as GOOD. When God made Adam He said, “It is not good for a man to be alone.” This is the first time God said something was not good. This was before sin. Adam was not complete without Eve. God made her as the completion of the team. Submission in marriage is a wife choosing to join her husband’s team. She is choosing to attach herself to him with the selfless motive of helping him make a home that is their “little bit of heaven on earth.”

15. We have already seen that a husband is to love his wife and consider her precious. What is the wife’s corresponding choice?

Ephesians 5:33 Nevertheless let every one of you in particular so love his wife even as himself; and the wife see that she **reverence [respect]** her husband.

It is interesting that God never commands a wife to love her husband. This implies that love is more natural to a woman. Women need love to satisfy their hearts’ longing. This is why it is so important for a godly husband to love his wife. She is a responder; and when he fills her up with his love, it will be very natural for her to love him in return.

God’s command for wives to respect their husbands is not natural for most women. God made man to need respect, and gave him a wife to satisfy this need. Respect carries with it the idea of believing in him to the point of cheering him on. He needs to hear her appreciation of him.

16. What special promise does God give to a woman who is married to an unsaved husband?

1 Peter 3:1-6 ... wives, be in subjection to your own husbands; that, if any obey not the word, **they** also **may without the word be won** by the conversation [lifestyle] of the wives; While they behold your chaste conversation coupled with fear. Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning of plaiting the hair, and of wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel; But let it be the hidden man of the heart, in that

which is not corruptible, even the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which is in the sight of God of great price. For after this manner in the old time the holy women also, who trusted in God, adorned themselves, being in subjection unto their own husbands: Even as Sara obeyed Abraham, calling him lord: whose daughters ye are, as long as ye do well, and are not afraid with any amazement.

- What outward evidence of the Spirit's filling will begin to win an unsaved husband to Christ?

While they behold your chaste [**holy**] conversation [**life-style**] coupled with fear [**respect**].

- What must be her focus to ensure that he sees this holiness and respect from her?

Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning of plaiting the hair; and of wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel; But **let it be the hidden man of the heart**, in that which is not corruptible, even **the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit**, which is in the sight of God of great price.

- What examples does God give of this kind of life?

For after this manner in the old time the holy women also, who trusted in God, adorned themselves, being in subjection unto their own husbands: Even as **Sara** obeyed Abraham.

- In whom was their ultimate confidence?

... holy women also, who **trusted in God**

- Why did Sarah call her husband lord?

The word “fear” and the word “lord” are Old English words that carry the idea of respect. Frankly, respect is almost a lost art in our culture, but it is a vital ingredient in a godly home.

17. Make a list of at least five things you respect about your husband.

Why don't you plan an appropriate time to express these specific areas of respect to him? You may be surprised at how much it pleases him. God made him to need this from you. You may underestimate the power you have in your relationship. If you become an expert in meeting this uniquely masculine need, your relationship will be revitalized with real intimacy and strength. He will be blessed and, in turn, you will be too.

No husband or wife can love or respect as God has planned unless their relationship with their spouse is flowing out of their relationship with God. One way I evaluate my relationship with God is by noticing how I am relating to my wife. If I am easily giving, expecting nothing in return, I know that I am experiencing God's abundant provision in my life to the point that I have plenty of overflow. If I am easily frustrated or am trying to manipulate and control her to do what I want her to do, then I know that I am walking in the flesh and can soon expect trouble in our relationship. I must constantly remind myself:

My primary relationship with God is a receiving relationship.

My primary relationship with others is a giving relationship.

Only when I surrender to God and look to Him alone to meet all my needs do I have the desire and ability to give to others. One benefit of a close relationship is that it indicates, good or bad, my personal spiritual health. Selfish responses indicate that I have forgotten to see God as my sovereign provider and have begun to expect that provision from my loved one. Most of us want to focus on changing our spouse. Don't do that. Number one, it is impossible; and number two, it will drive him or her crazy. **The only person you have the ability to change is yourself.** One of my greatest confidences is the Christian's ability to change. The Holy Spirit is our change agent. Focus on Christ and ask Him to make you the husband or wife your spouse needs.

The third ingredient of a godly home is godly children. It is not necessary to have children to have a godly home; but if there are children in your home, they must be godly if you are to continue growing toward God's ideal for a Christian home.

Children

18. How does the Bible describe children?

Psalms 127:3

Lo, **children are an heritage [gift] of the LORD**: and the fruit of the womb is His reward.

19. What are children commanded to do?

Ephesians 6:1-3

Children, obey your parents in the Lord: for this is right. **Honor your father and mother**; (which is the first commandment with promise;) That it may be well with you, and you may live long on the earth.

20. From this passage on loyalty and faithfulness in marriage, why does God give us children?

Malachi 2:15

And did not He make one? Yet had He the residue of the spirit. And wherefore one? **That He might seek a godly seed**. Therefore take heed to your spirit, and let none deal treacherously against the wife of his youth.

21. How can parents raise godly children?

Proverbs 22:6

Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it.

Biblical Training

22. As the head of his family, what is a godly father commanded not to do?

Ephesians 6:4

And, ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath: but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

➤ What is he commanded to do?

...Bring them up in the _____ and _____ of the Lord.

Obviously this is a two-parent job as a wife joins her husband to build a godly home working side by side with him to train up godly children. The word “nurture” carries with it the idea of training or discipline. A great picture of this process is a soldier in training for deployment. He is trained in a controlled, safe environment so that he will be ready to face an uncontrolled, hostile battlefield. A godly home is like a greenhouse. It provides the nutrients and warm environment needed to prepare godly children for a cold, harsh world. The word “discipline” does not simply refer to punishment when a child has done wrong. It is the process of disciplining a child to be strong and prepared to face the world as a young adult. This process is designed to build character into the fabric of the child, and demands hard work and a disciplined lifestyle.

The word “admonition” could literally be translated “to set the mind” like setting the table for dinner. You put everything in place and get it ready for use. The training of a godly mind includes filling the moral warehouse of the child. When a child has been properly trained in biblical distinctions of right and wrong, his conscience is prepared to continue disciplining him when they grow to maturity and independence.

23. How would you describe biblical chastisement?

Proverbs 13:24 He that spares his rod hates his son: but he that loves him **chastens him betimes [early]**.

24. What is the result of loving chastisement?

Proverbs 22:15 Foolishness [**rebellion**] is bound in the heart of a child; but the rod of correction shall **drive it far from him**.

25. What is the spiritual result of chastisement?

Proverbs 23:13-14 Withhold not correction from the child: for if thou beat him with the rod, he shall not die. You shall beat him with the rod, and shall **deliver his soul from hell**.

These old English words seem harsh, but the message is simple and clear. Appropriate corporal punishment is part of God's prescription for raising godly children. God is our example of a loving Father, and He is never angry or abusive in His chastisement. He is firm and consistent in dealings with His children.

26. Who does God not chastise?

Hebrews 12:5-8 My son, despise not thou the chastening of the Lord, nor faint when you are rebuked of Him: For whom the Lord loves He chastens, and scourges every son whom He receives. If you endure chastening, God is dealing with you as with sons; for what son is he whom the father chastens not? But if you be without chastisement, whereof all are partakers, then are you bastards [**not true children**], **and not sons**.

God designed loving chastisement to be an effective tool in godly parenting. He calls it an act of love, and it is certainly not to be applied out of anger. He planned for it to be combined with other forms of discipline: godly instruction, encouragement, and the building of loving, trusting relationships. All of this must flow from a Spirit-filled Christian. In essence, God wants to raise your children through you. He is their Father and is using you to show them His love and lead them to place their trust in Him.

Family Devotions

27. What are we to teach our children?

Deuteronomy 6:6-7 And **these Words**, which I command thee this day, shall be in your heart: And you shall **teach them diligently unto thy children**, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lay down, and when you rise up.

II Timothy 3:15-16 And that from a child you have known **the holy Scriptures**, which are able to make you wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus. All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness:

28. Who should lead the home in godly instruction?

Genesis 18:18-19a Seeing that Abraham shall surely become a great and mighty nation, and all the nations of the earth shall be blessed in him? For I know him, that **he will command his children and his household after him, and they shall keep the way of the LORD**, to do justice and judgment;

Genesis 35:2-3a Then **Jacob said unto his household**, and to all that were with him, Put away the strange gods that are among you, and be clean, and change your garments: And let us arise, and go up to Bethel; and I will make there an altar unto God

Joshua 24:15 And if it seem evil unto you to serve the LORD, choose you this day whom ye will serve; whether the gods which your fathers served that were on the other side of the flood, or the gods of the Amorites, in whose land ye dwell: but **as for me and my house, we will serve the LORD.**

Through the years, godly husbands and fathers have led their families in a time of Bible instruction and prayer. It may only take a few minutes every day, but it sets a precedent in your home as Joshua did in his. You are saying, “As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord!” The example a man sets for his children and the accountability he keeps with his wife are essential. One of the most important ingredients of a godly home is a daily time of family devotions.

The Sacredness of the Home

God designed the home to show His love and care for His children, and their loyalty and devotion to Him. Our home can only become this picture of heaven on earth as we walk in the power and victory of the Holy Spirit. I was once talking to a wife about her husband and she said something that was a little alarming to me when she first said it. She told me that living with her husband was “like living with Jesus.” She was not being sacrilegious; she was experiencing a husband who was living the Spirit-filled life.

29. Remember who Paul said was living in Him?

Galatians 2:20a I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless I live; yet not I, but **Christ lives in me.**

Paul was living the Christ-life. The Spirit of Christ was controlling his every thought and action. Jesus wants to live through you in your home. We sing a song in our church entitled *Heaven Came Down and Glory Filled My Soul*. This is how we build homes that are “a little bit of Heaven on earth.” The day we got saved, God put His Holy Spirit in our lives as down payment for Heaven. We let Him fill our souls as we first display Spirit-filled living in our homes and then to the rest of the world.

A great travesty in our culture is the destruction of our homes through divorce. In an argument between God and the Israelites recorded in the book of Malachi God accused the nation of dealing treacherously, committing abominations, and profaning the holiness of the Lord. He also accused them of covering His altar with tears, and weeping and wailing to the point that He was no longer hearing their prayers. Malachi 2:14 records the climax of the argument:

Yet you say, Wherefore? Because the LORD has been witness between you and the wife of your youth, against whom you have dealt treacherously: yet she is your companion, and the wife of your covenant.

30. How does God view divorce?

Malachi 2:15-16 ... take heed to your spirit, and let none deal treacherously against the wife of his youth. For **the LORD, the God of Israel**, says that He **hates putting away [divorce]**: for one covers violence with his garment, says the LORD of hosts: therefore take heed to your spirit, that you deal not treacherously.

31. Is divorce ever a Biblical option?

Mark 10:6-9 But from the beginning of the creation God made them male and female. For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother, and cleave to his wife; And they twain shall be one flesh: so then they are no more twain, but one flesh. **What therefore God hath joined together, let not man put asunder.**

32. What did Christ say about those who remarry after a divorce?

Matthew 19:9 And I say unto you, Whosoever shall put away his wife, except it be for fornication, and shall marry another, **commits adultery**: and whoso marries her which is put away **commits adultery**.

You can't change a divorce in your history, but you can confess it to God and get it right with Him. Determine to honor God's institution of marriage for the rest of your life. God doesn't want us to live in guilt. Once you have dealt with this, don't allow the devil to continue beating you up with it. Use feelings of hurt or regret to fuel your zeal for the Lord today and in the future.

How to adopt God's attitude toward my money

As a Christian you will have a different attitude toward wealth than you had before you were saved. God has given us the privilege of living in and for His eternal kingdom. You have probably seen the bumper sticker that reads, "The one who dies with the most toys wins." I saw one recently that puts things into perspective. It read, "The one who dies with the most toys still dies." No matter what we are able to accumulate here on earth, we cannot take any of it with us; yet everything we do in and for the eternal kingdom of God will last forever. God teaches us that we are not owners of what we possess, but stewards. God owns everything and will ask us to give account of how we utilized what He allowed us to have while we were here on earth. He expects us to support His work and has promised to reward those who do. In this world of borrowing and acquiring more and more things, we must remind ourselves of the Biblical injunctions regarding materialism. Study this lesson carefully, and discover rich treasures in God's Word!

Psalm 119:72 The Law of Thy mouth is better unto me than thousands of gold and silver.

Psalm 119:127 Therefore I love Thy Commandments above gold; yea, above fine gold.

ETERNAL VERSUS TEMPORAL

I. What is the most valuable thing entrusted to you?

Matthew 16:26 For what is a man profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose **his own soul**? or what shall a man give in exchange for **his soul**?

Jesus used these questions to sum up a rebuke He gave Simon Peter. The root of Peter's error was savoring the things of men instead of the things of God. Jesus then invited all the disciples to follow Him, telling them that such a decision would demand self-denial in this life, but would yield eternal value in the life to come. He was talking about filling one's soul with the desires and values of the eternal kingdom of God versus the temporal things of this age. Even if we could accumulate everything our soul could desire, it would not satisfy. Only filling our soul with the living Spirit of God gives real life and value.

2. In the parable of the rich fool, what happened to the man who pursued material wealth at the expense of his own soul?

Luke 12:15-21

And he said unto them, Take heed, and **beware of covetousness**: for a man's life consists not in the abundance of the things which he possesses. And He spoke a parable unto them, saying, The ground of a certain rich man brought forth plentifully: And he thought within himself, saying, What shall I do, because I have no room where to bestow my fruits? And he said, This will I do: I will pull down my barns, and build greater; and there will I bestow all my fruits and my goods. And I will say to my soul, Soul, thou hast much goods laid up for many years; take your ease, eat, drink, and be merry. But God said unto him, You fool, **this night your soul shall be required of you**: then whose shall those things be, which thou hast provided? So is he that lays up treasure for himself, and is not rich toward God.

- Read the first verse again. What lesson was Jesus trying to teach by this parable?

- How would you describe the word “covetousness”?

- Covetousness is wanting what God has not chosen to give you. It is a greedy desire for what we can't or shouldn't have. Why did Jesus say to beware of it?

Like most people in our culture, we can work to accumulate things or we can aim at being rich toward God. Which are you doing, and which is more valuable?

3. Will earthly riches equate to eternal riches?

Matthew 19:23-26 Then said Jesus unto His disciples, Verily I say unto you, That a rich man shall hardly enter into the kingdom of heaven. And again I say unto you, It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle, than for a rich man to enter into the kingdom of God. When his disciples heard it, they were exceedingly amazed, saying, Who then can be saved? But Jesus beheld them, and said unto them, With men this is impossible; but with God all things are possible.

4. What is the danger of working for the sole purpose of becoming rich?

Proverbs 23:4-5 Labor not to be rich: cease from your own wisdom. Will you set your eyes upon that which is not? for riches certainly make themselves wings; they fly away as an eagle toward heaven.

5. Why does God tell us to focus on the invisible kingdom of God?

II Corinthians 4:18 While we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen: for the things which are seen are temporal; but the things which are not seen are eternal.

Verses 4-7 of the same passage teach that the real treasure in this world is the light that Jesus brings into our life at salvation, and the pursuit that is genuinely valuable is introducing the world to “the light of the glorious Gospel of Christ.”

The Sermon on the Mount, the longest message Jesus preached, is recorded in the book of Matthew. A large portion of this important sermon deals with His value system regarding treasures.

6. What are the reasons given for not working for temporal treasures, but rather laboring tirelessly for eternal treasure?

Matthew 6:19-20 Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust doth corrupt, and where thieves break through and steal: But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal:

7. What is the alarming truth concerning our treasure and our heart?

Matthew 6:21 For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.

Note: We make a choice about where we are going to put our treasure, and our heart follows that choice.

The next few verses warn us of the danger of trying to labor for both temporal and eternal treasure. We must choose which we will serve.

Matthew 6:24 No man can serve two masters: for either he will hate the one, and love the other; or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. **You cannot serve God and mammon** [earthly riches personified into a deity].

8. He continues by teaching us not to center our lives on physical needs. What enables us to stop worrying about earthly needs?

Matthew 6:31-32 Therefore take no thought, saying, "What shall we eat?" or, "What shall we drink?" or, "Wherewithal shall we be clothed?" (For after **all these things** do the Gentiles seek;) for **your heavenly Father knows that you have need of all these things.**

9. On what must we center our lives?

Matthew 6:33 But **seek first the kingdom of God**, and His righteousness; and **all these things shall be added unto you**.

What does Jesus promise when we put his invisible, eternal kingdom first in our lives?

Notice the phrase “all these things.” It is used three times in two verses. Things are important, even necessary, but not as important and necessary as Christ’s Kingdom. God knows we only have so much emotional energy to expend. If we expend our energy on earthly anxieties and desires, we will have none left for what is truly valuable. Jesus sums up the passage with this verse:

Matthew 6:34 Take therefore no thought for the morrow: for the morrow shall take thought for the things of itself. Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof.

STEWARDSHIP VERSUS OWNERSHIP

The famous 16th century preacher John Wesley described the difference between the temporal and the eternal this way: “When the possessor of Heaven and Earth brought you into being and placed you in this world, He placed you here not as an owner, but as a steward - as such He entrusted you for a season with goods of various kinds - but the sole property of these still rests in Him, nor can ever be alienated from Him. As you are not your own but His, such is likewise all you enjoy.” We must learn to properly manage what the Lord places within our care.

10. Who is the real owner of all things?

Psalms 24:1 **The earth is the LORD’S**, and the fullness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein.

Psalm 50: 10-12 For every beast of the forest is Mine, and the cattle upon a thousand hills. I know all the fowls of the mountains: and the wild beasts of the field are Mine. If I were hungry, I would not tell you: for **the world is Mine**, and the fullness thereof.

Landowners in Bible times often utilized a steward to manage their estates. Servants were employed to run the day-to-day affairs of their properties and assets. The landowner would only take account of the books periodically. Jesus told a parable about an unjust steward who knew such an accounting was coming. Because the property was not his own, he utilized his power over the use of those things to secure a good standing for himself so that when he was fired from his job, he would still have friends to draw from in his life after stewardship. While not condoning his dishonesty, Jesus commended his wisdom.

11. How does Jesus want us to utilize our power over the things He has entrusted to our care?

Luke 16:8,9 And the lord commended the unjust steward, because he had done wisely: for the children of this world are in their generation wiser than the children of light. And I say unto you, **Make to yourselves friends of the mammon of unrighteousness**; that, when ye fail, they may receive you into everlasting habitations.

God wants you to use things to reach people for the Kingdom of God instead of using people to acquire things.

12. What does God require of His stewards?

I Corinthians 4:2 Moreover it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful.

Jesus told another parable of a master who was going away for a long time. He made three of his servants stewards over large sums of money called a talent. Each talent was worth about fifteen years' wages, or \$500,000 - \$700,000. He gave one five talents, another two talents and to the last one talent.

13. List what each man did with his master's money and the master's response to each servant.

Matthew 25:15-30 And unto one he gave five talents, to another two, and to another one; to every man according to his several ability; and straightway took his journey. Then **he that had received the five talents went and traded with the same, and made them other five talents.** And likewise **he that had received two, he also gained other two. But he that had received one went and dug in the earth, and hid his lord's money.** After a long time the lord of those servants came, and reckoned with them. And so **he that had received five talents** came and brought other five talents, saying, "Lord, you delivered unto me five talents: behold, I have gained beside them five talents more." His lord said unto him, "**Well done, good and faithful servant:** you have been faithful over a few things, I will make you ruler over many things: enter into the joy of your lord." **He also that had received two talents** came and said, "Lord, you delivered unto me two talents: behold, I have gained two other talents beside them." His lord said unto him, "**Well done, good and faithful servant;** you have been faithful over a few things, I will make you ruler over many things: enter into the joy of your lord." Then **he which had received the one talent** came and said, Lord, "I knew you that you are a hard man, reaping where you have not sown, and gathering where you have not strawed: And I was afraid, and went and hid your talent in the earth: lo, there you have that is yours." His lord answered and said unto him, "**You wicked and slothful servant,** you knew that I reap where I sowed not, and gather where I have not strawed: You ought therefore to have put my money to the exchangers, and then at my coming I should have received mine own with usury. **Take therefore the talent from him,** and give it unto him which hath ten talents. For unto every one that has shall be given, and **he shall have abundance:** but from him that hath not shall be taken away even that which he hath. And cast the unprofitable servant into outer darkness: there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth."

The abundance given as a reward to those who have invested their Lord's money wisely is no doubt a picture of the eternal reward given to those who invest their earthly stewardship into the invisible, eternal kingdom of God.

GIVING VERSUS GETTING

14. The very last words Paul spoke to the church leaders in Asia indicate the importance Paul placed on giving. Why does God want us to give?

Acts 20:35

I have showed you all things, how that so laboring you ought to support the weak, and to remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he said, **It is more blessed to give than to receive.**

15. What promise allows us to give generously?

Philippians 4:19

But **my God shall supply all your need** according to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus.

16. What word describes the mindset God wants us to have?

1 Timothy 6:6-8

But **godliness with contentment is great gain.** For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can

carry nothing out. And having food and raiment let us be therewith content.

17. Does the Bible say it is wrong to be rich?

1 Timothy 6:9-10 But **they that will be rich** fall into temptation and a snare, and into many foolish and hurtful lusts, which drown men in destruction and perdition. For **the love of money** is the root of all evil: which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows.

➤ What is the root of every kind of evil?

Having money is not wrong; loving money is. In fact, God recognizes that some are going to be wealthier than others, and gives advice to help them best utilize their earthly assets.

18. How does the Bible describe riches?

1 Timothy 6:17-19 Charge them that are rich in this world, that they be not highminded, nor trust in **uncertain riches**, but in the living God, who gives us richly all things to enjoy; That they do good, that they be rich in good works, ready to distribute, willing to communicate; **Laying up in store** for themselves **a good foundation** against the time to come, that they may lay hold on eternal life.

➤ When we give of our earthly goods, what are we actually doing?

19. We live in a world that is always hungering for more. To what does the Bible equate this covetous mindset?

Ephesians 5:5 For this ye know, that no whoremonger, nor unclean person, nor **covetous man, who is an idolater**, hath any inheritance in the kingdom of Christ and of God.

Colossians 3:5 Mortify therefore your members which are upon the earth; fornication, uncleanness, inordinate affection, evil concupiscence, and **covetousness, which is idolatry**.

The right attitude about money is not possible without the Holy Spirit's control. Paul actually called the giving of the churches of Macedonia the grace of God.

20. What do you see that indicates Spirit-filled living in the lives of the Macedonian givers?

II Corinthians 8:1-5 Moreover, brethren, we do you to wit [witness] of **the grace of God** bestowed on the churches of Macedonia; How that in a great trial of affliction the abundance of their joy and their deep poverty abounded unto the riches of their liberality. For to their power, I bear record, yea, and beyond their power they were willing of themselves; Praying us with much entreaty that we would receive the gift, and take upon us the fellowship of the ministering to the saints. And this they did, not as we hoped, but **first gave their own selves to the Lord**, and unto us by the will of God.

21. Who first demonstrated the grace of giving?

II Corinthians 8:9 For ye know **the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ**, that, though He was rich, yet for your sakes He became poor, that you through His poverty might be rich.

Notice the beauty of the exchange Christ made for us. Can you ever give more than Christ gave to you?

TITHING VERSUS "TIPPING"

The baseline for biblical giving is called tithing.

22. What is the definition of the word “tithe”?

Leviticus 27:32 And concerning the tithe of the herd, or of the flock, even of whatsoever passes under the rod, **the tenth shall be holy unto the LORD.**

The first mention of any truth in the Bible often lays the foundation for the expansion of that truth throughout the rest of the Bible. This is true of the first mention of tithing recorded in Genesis 14:17-24. Abraham gave tithes of the spoil of battle to Melchizedek, a type of Christ.

23. In your opinion, why did Abraham give Melchizedek a tithe?

Genesis 14:19-20 And he [Melchizedek] blessed him, and said, **Blessed be Abram of the most high God, possessor of heaven and earth:** And blessed be the most high God, which hath delivered thine enemies into thy hand. And he gave him tithes of all.

24. What reason did Abraham give for refusing money from the wicked king of Sodom?

Genesis 14:22 And Abram said to the king of Sodom, **I have lift up mine hand unto the LORD, the most high God, the possessor of heaven and earth,**

Because Abraham recognized that he had been blessed with success by God, he was giving a portion of the blessing back to God to acknowledge that everything he possessed had come from God. The phrase “I have lift up mine hand” signified a covenant made with God. As you invest your money in the Lord’s work, you are making a statement about your own personal relationship with God, acknowledging His ownership of everything you have.

25. What sin did God accuse his people of committing when they refused to tithe?

Malachi 3:8

Will a man rob God? Yet you have robbed Me. But you say, "Wherein have we robbed Thee?" In tithes and offerings.

26. How does God challenge His children to tithe?

Malachi 3:10

Bring all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in Mine house, and **prove Me now** herewith, says the LORD of hosts, **if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing**, that there shall not be room enough to receive it.

God's plan for caring for the house of God is that all His people give generously to His work. If each church member were to give a baseline 10% of his income to his local church, the church would be able to invest far more in God's eternal, invisible kingdom. According to a recent Barna Research report, only "9% of born again Christians tithed their income to churches in 2004." <www.barna.org> By our disobedience we are missing great spiritual blessing from God.

27. What promise does God give to those who are obedient in their giving?

Luke 6:38

Give, and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over, shall men give into your bosom. For with the same measure that you mete withal it shall be measured to you again.

28. What attitude does God desire from those who give?

II Corinthians 9:6,7

But this I say, He which sows sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which sows bountifully shall reap also bountifully. Every man according as he purposes in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity: for **God loves a cheerful giver.**

29. When should you give your tithes and offerings?

I Corinthians 16:1-2 Now concerning the collection for the saints, as I have given order to the churches of Galatia, even so do ye. **Upon the first day of the week** let every one of you lay by him in store, **as God hath prospered** him, that there be no gatherings when I come.

➤ What is the standard of giving mentioned here?

The Bible directs us to regular, purposeful giving in proportion to His provision. God's reward to the 5 talent servant and the 2 talent servant was the same. God rewards faithful stewardship.

SAVING VERSUS BORROWING

"The total amount of consumer [unsecured] debt in the United States stands at nearly \$2.6 trillion dollars - and based on the latest Census statistics, that works out to be nearly \$8,500 in debt for every man, woman and child that lives in the US."

This is not counting mortgages. This is \$34,000 of consumer debt for an average family of four.

"The size of the total consumer debt grew nearly five times in size from 1980 (\$355 billion) to 2001 (\$1.7 trillion)."

"Nearly one in every 35 households in the United States filed for bankruptcy in 2007."
<www.money-zine.com>

We live in a "buy now / pay later" culture, but the Bible doesn't promote this lifestyle.

30. What does the Bible teach concerning debt?

Proverbs 22:7b ... the borrower is servant to the lender.

31. What does the Bible call people who don't repay their debts?

Psalm 37:21 The wicked borrows, and pays not again: but the righteous shows mercy, and gives.

32. What are some items for which we should not borrow?

Nehemiah 5:3-5 Some also there were that said, We have mortgaged our lands, vineyards, and houses, that **we might buy corn**, because of the dearth. There were also that said, We have borrowed money **for the king's tribute**, and that upon our lands and vineyards. Yet now our flesh is as the flesh of our brethren, our children as their children: and, lo, we bring into bondage our sons and our daughters to be servants, and some of our daughters are brought unto bondage already: neither is it in our power to redeem them; for other men have our lands and vineyards.

The Bible promotes the “pay as you go and save for the future” lifestyle.

33. What words does God use to describe those who save?

Proverbs 15:6 In the house of the **righteous** is much treasure: but in the revenues of the wicked is trouble.

Proverbs 21:20 There is treasure to be desired and oil in the dwelling of the **wise**; but a foolish man spends it up.

➤ How does God describe those who do not save?

34. What is a motive to save as much as you can?

Proverbs 19:14 **House and riches are the inheritance** of fathers: and a prudent wife is from the LORD.

Proverbs 13:22 **A good man leaves an inheritance** to his children's children: and the wealth of the sinner is laid up for the just.

The Bible also promotes a strong work ethic. One of the Ten Commandments teaches the importance of long days and long weeks of hard labor. The principle is to rest so you can work, not work so you can rest.

Exodus 20:9-10 Six days shall you labor, and do all thy work: But the seventh day is the Sabbath of the LORD thy God: in it you shall not do any work

35. What is the priority taught in this verse?

Proverbs 24:27 Prepare your work without, and make it fit for yourself in the field; and afterwards build your house.

36. What does the Bible teach should happen to people who won't work?

II Thessalonians 3:10 For even when we were with you, this we commanded you, that if any would not work, **neither should he eat.**

37. What does this verse teach about hard work?

Ephesians 4:28 Let him that stole steal no more: but rather **let him labor, working with his hands** the thing which is good, **that he may have to give** to him that needs.

From contentment to over-borrowing, and from working to giving, God has shown us what to do. The Holy Spirit of God will enable us to make the changes necessary to do it.

- Romans 11:36 For of him, and through him, and to him, are all things: to whom be glory for ever. Amen.
- Philippians 2:13 For it is God which works in you both to will and to do of his good pleasure.

Fulfilling the purpose of the Spirit-filled life - service for the King

The purpose of the Spirit-filled life is to manifest or demonstrate Christ to the world around us. God doesn't fill us so that we can be full and satisfied. He fills us so that He can pour His life into the world through us. The most exciting truth in the world is who we are in Christ. Each of us is a new creation. God has filled us with the victory of Jesus and enabled us to live that victory in the face of every imaginable opposition. Paul uses Romans 8:37 to answer the question of what might defeat us. "Nay, in all these things **we are more than conquerors through Him** that loved us." Now that we have this victorious power from God, He plans for us to use that power to serve in His eternal, invisible Kingdom.

THE ENABLING

1. What is the purpose for God's grace?

II Corinthians 9:8 And God is able to make all grace abound toward you; **that you**, always having all sufficiency in all things, **may abound to every good work.**

Ephesians 2:8-10 For by grace are you saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast. For **we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works**, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them.

2. Grace is God's supernatural enablement to do what only God can do. What good work was Paul energized by God's grace to do?

Ephesians 3:7-8 Whereof I was made a minister; according to the gift of the grace of God given unto me by the effectual working of his power. Unto me, who am less than the least of all saints, is this grace given, **that I should preach: among the Gentiles the unsearchable riches of Christ.**

3. In the following verse as in Galatians 2:20 Paul used the phrase “yet not I” to describe the supernatural ability to live as he did. What was Paul able to do that the phrase “yet not I” describes?

I Corinthians 15:10-11 But **by the grace of God** I am what I am: and His grace which was bestowed upon me was not in vain; but **I labored more abundantly** than they all: yet not I, but the grace of God which was with me. Therefore whether *it were* I or they, so **we preach**, and so **you believed**.

THE CALL

Aren't you glad you got saved? Think back to the day you accepted Christ. What did it take for you to become a Christian? Obviously, salvation is from God, but it probably took a person to explain God's Word to you, to show you how to receive Christ's exchange. Now that you are saved, you have the privilege and responsibility to tell others the Good News!

4. Even Jesus lived in dependence on the Holy Spirit. What did the Holy Spirit enable Him to do during His earthly ministry?

Luke 4:18 The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because **He has anointed Me to preach the gospel** to the poor; He hath sent Me **to heal the brokenhearted, to preach deliverance** to the captives, and **recovering of sight** to the blind, to **set at liberty** them that are bruised,

5. What did Jesus promise those who follow Him?

Matthew 4:19 And He said unto them, Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men.

6. What was His final command to the disciples? Do you remember what this command is called?

Mark 16:15 And he said unto them, Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature.

7. Can anyone be saved? _____ What must happen before someone can be saved? _____

Romans 10:13-15 For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? and **how shall they hear without a preacher?** And how shall they preach, except they be sent? as it is written, **How beautiful are the feet of them that preach the gospel of peace**, and bring glad tidings of good things!

The word “preacher” does not indicate a professional, but anyone who proclaims the Gospel of peace. How does God view those who broadcast His good news?

8. What kind of life has God chosen for you?

John 15:16 Ye have not chosen me, **but I have chosen you**, and ordained you, **that you should go and bring forth fruit**, and that your fruit should remain: that whatsoever ye shall ask of the Father in My name, He may give it you.

9. Earlier in this discourse Jesus told His disciples what they needed to be equipped to be a fruitful Christian. What was it?

John 15:4-5 **Abide in me**, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine; no more can you, except ye abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches: He that abides in me, and I in him, **the same brings forth much fruit**: for without me ye can do nothing.

THE BOLDNESS

10. How did abiding in Jesus change the disciples’ ministry after His ascension?

Acts 4:13 Now when they [the rulers] saw **the boldness of Peter and John**, and perceived that they were unlearned and ignorant men, they marveled; and they took knowledge of them, that **they had been with Jesus**.

This boldness became a trademark of Jesus' followers. Shortly after this incident the disciples were threatened never to "speak at all nor teach in the name of Jesus" again. Even though they were released under close scrutiny, they went immediately to the church, reported the situation and had a powerful prayer meeting.

11. We probably would have prayed for protection, but what did they pray for?

Acts 4:29, 31

And now, Lord, behold their threatenings: and **grant unto thy servants, that with all boldness they may speak thy word**, ... And when they had prayed, **the place was shaken** where they were assembled together; and **they were all filled with the Holy Ghost**, and **they spoke the word of God with boldness**.

Notice the result of their prayers. God often used miraculous events in these early days to demonstrate His pleasure with His people, and in some cases displeasure. Though we should not expect a repeat of this spectacular demonstration of God's pleasure, we can expect God to continue to give boldness to those who look to Him for it. Years later the Apostle Paul was still asking for that same boldness.

12. What words in these prayer requests indicate the importance of grace and boldness in evangelism?

Ephesians 6:18-20

Praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, and watching thereunto with all perseverance and supplication for all saints; And for me, that **utterance may be given unto me**, that I may **open my mouth boldly**, to make known the mystery of the gospel, For which I am an ambassador in bonds: that therein **I may speak boldly, as I ought to speak**.

Colossians 4:3-6

Withal praying also for us, that God would open unto us **a door of utterance**, to speak the mystery of Christ, for which I am also in bonds: That I may **make it manifest, as I ought to speak**. Walk in wisdom toward them that are without, redeeming the time. **Let your speech be always with grace**, seasoned with salt, that **you may know how you ought to answer** every man.

THE POWER

13. What picture did Jesus use to show the abundant supply of power available to His servants?

John 7:38-39 He that believeth on me, as the scripture hath said, **out of his belly shall flow rivers of living water.** (But **this spoke he of the Spirit**, which they that believe on him should receive...)

14. What did Jesus tell His disciples to do that demonstrated the necessity of the Holy Spirit's power in soul-winning?

Luke 24:49 And, behold, I send the promise of my Father upon you: but **tarry** in the city of Jerusalem, **until you be endued with power from on high.**

The New Testament is filled with examples of the Holy Spirit's power displayed in evangelism. One such story is found in Acts 18 when Paul first arrived in the city of Corinth. He had faced persecution from the unbelieving religious leaders in many of the cities he had visited, and he was facing it again in Corinth. God spoke to him in a dream one night to give him courage to continue preaching.

Acts 18:9-10 Then spoke the Lord to Paul in the night by a vision, "**Be not afraid, but speak**, and hold not your peace: For I am with you, and no man shall set on you to hurt you: for **I have much people in this city.**"

In the passage below Paul recounts those early days in a letter to the Corinthians.

15. Was Paul depending on his own oratory skills to convince men to turn to Jesus?

I Corinthians 2:1-5 And I, brethren, when I came to you, **came not with excellency of speech** or of wisdom, declaring unto you the testimony of God. For I determined not to know any thing among you, save Jesus Christ, and him crucified. And I was with you in weakness, and in fear, and in much trembling. And my speech and my preaching was not with

enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power: That your faith should not stand in the wisdom of men, but in the power of God.

- What was his focus?

For **I determined not to know any thing among you, save Jesus Christ, and him crucified.**

- How does Paul characterize his abilities and emotions?

And I was with you in **weakness**, and in **fear**, and in **much trembling.**

- What characterized his preaching?

And my speech and my preaching was not with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in **demonstration of the Spirit and of power.**

- Why doesn't God remove our own weaknesses and fears when He give us His power?

That **your faith should** not **stand** in the wisdom of men, but **in the power of God.**

II Corinthians 2:14-7:6 is an unusually transparent glimpse into the heart of Paul and demonstrates these wonderful characteristics of God's power on display through his frail human life. I love the use of the word "manifest" throughout this passage. It powerfully captures the Christ-life principle. Christ's life is evidenced in Paul, but his weaknesses are still apparent, at least to him.

- 16. Can you describe the fragrance of Christ in this familiar passage?

II Corinthians 2:14-16 Now thanks be unto God, which always causes us to triumph in Christ, and makes manifest the savor of His

knowledge by us in every place. For **we are unto God a sweet savor of Christ, in them that are saved, and in them that perish:** To the one we are the savor of death unto death; and to the other the savor of life unto life. And who is sufficient for these things? For we are not as many, which corrupt the word of God: but as of sincerity, but as of God, in the sight of God speak we in Christ.

- In what two ways is the invisible, powerful, invasive aura of Christ in the Spirit-filled Christian's life perceived?

To the one we are **the savor of death unto death**; and to the other **the savor of life unto life**. And who is sufficient for these things?

We do not determine how people perceive the aura of Christ in our lives. We only determine if we are filled with His fragrance. Some have predetermined to reject Christ. They sense Christ in us as unattractive as the smell of death. By rejecting our testimony they are rejecting Christ and, thus, thrust themselves toward eternal death unless something changes. Some are predisposed to accept Christ. They sense Christ in us as attractive as the smell of life in springtime. By accepting our testimony they are accepting Christ and, thus, propelling themselves into eternal life! No wonder Paul said, "Who is sufficient for these things?"

- What is necessary to bring this predisposition in the hearer to the surface?

For we are not as many, which corrupt the word of God: but as of sincerity, but as of God, in the sight of God **speak we in Christ**.

Some in Paul's day tried to "corrupt" the Word of God, by "peddling" Christ. A peddler would put the best apples on top of his basket and leave the less desirable ones hidden underneath. Paul was determined to simply speak the truth about Jesus in the power of God and let the Word speak for itself.

In chapter 4 Paul continues his discussion about the power of the Gospel by emphasizing the urgency of not letting the good news of Jesus be hidden.

17. Who will suffer if we hide our Gospel witness?

II Corinthians 4:3-7 But **if our gospel be hid, it is hid to them that are lost**: In whom the god of this world hath blinded the minds of them which believe not, lest the light of the glorious gospel of Christ, who is the image of God, should shine unto them. For we preach not ourselves, but Christ Jesus the Lord; and ourselves your servants for Jesus' sake. For God, who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts, to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ. But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, that the excellency of the power may be of God, and not of us.

➤ Who is the God of this world?

➤ How do we combat his evil intent?

For we **preach** not ourselves, but **Christ Jesus the Lord**; and ourselves your servants for Jesus' sake. For God, who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts, to **give the light** of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

➤ Do you have what it takes to let people see the light of the glorious Gospel of Christ?

But **we have this treasure** in earthen vessels, that **the excellency of the power** may be of God, and not of us.

18. How did your life change when Christ saved you?

II Corinthians 5:17-20 Therefore **if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature**: old things are passed away; behold, **all things are become new**. And all things are of God, who hath reconciled us to himself by Jesus Christ, and hath given to us the ministry of reconciliation; To wit,

that God was in Christ, reconciling the world unto himself, not imputing their trespasses unto them; and hath committed unto us the word of reconciliation. Now then we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God did beseech you by us: we pray you in Christ's stead, be ye reconciled to God.

- What ministry did God give you when He reconciled you to Himself through Jesus' exchange?

And all things are of God, who hath reconciled us to himself by Jesus Christ, and hath given to us **the ministry of reconciliation**; To wit, that God was in Christ, reconciling the world unto himself, not imputing their trespasses unto them; and hath committed unto us **the word [message] of reconciliation**.

- What human position does God use to help us see our role in dealing with the lost world?

Now then we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God did beseech you by us: we pray you **in Christ's stead**, be ye reconciled to God.

An ambassador is sent as an official representative to a foreign country. Notice the urgency and passion with which Paul exercises his role as Christ's ambassador. As we are filled by His Holy Spirit, God wants us to display the Christ-life not only in our actions, but even in our inner passions. The next verse is one of the clearest expressions in the Bible of the exchange Christ offers the world.

II Corinthians 5:21 For He has made Him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him.

THE NEED FOR A GOSPEL WITNESS

21. Who is the only way of salvation?

John 14:6

Jesus said unto him, I am the way, the truth, and the life: **no man cometh unto the Father, but by me.**

Acts 4:12

Neither is there salvation in any other: for **there is none other name** under heaven given among men, **whereby we must be saved.**

THE COURAGE FOR A GOSPEL WITNESS

22. What promise was given the disciples that would enable them to take the Gospel to the entire world?

Acts 1:8

But ye shall receive **power**, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth.

II Timothy 1:7

For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of **power**, and of **love**, and of a **sound mind.**

God knows our tendency toward fear. Remember, His victory does not remove our fleshly tendencies, but counteracts them with a stronger law. The power and love of God is flowing through the heart of a Spirit-filled Christian. When you choose to follow the prompting of the Holy Spirit to speak in the power of Christ,

He energizes your mind with all that you have learned about Christ, and uses you to effectively dispense Himself to the hearer.

THE MOTIVE FOR THE GOSPEL WITNESS

24. Who does God want to save?

II Peter 3:9 The Lord is not slack concerning his promise, as some men count slackness; but is longsuffering to us-ward, **not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance.**

ITimothy 2:13b-4 ... God our Savior; **Who will have all men to be saved**, and to come unto the knowledge of the truth.

Revelation 22:17 And the Spirit and the bride [the church] say, Come. And let him that hears say, Come. And let him that is athirst come. And **whosoever will**, let him take the water of life freely.

25. What does God want us to expect when we give people the Gospel?

John 4:35 Say not you, There are yet four months, and then comes harvest? behold, I say unto you, Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for **they are white already to harvest.**

26. What does the Bible say about a person who wins others to Christ?

Proverbs 11:30 The fruit of the righteous is a tree of life; and **he that wins souls is wise.**

THE METHOD FOR A GOSPEL WITNESS

27. What is the power of God unto salvation?

Romans 1:14-16 I am debtor both to the Greeks, and to the Barbarians; both to the wise, and to the unwise. So, as much as in me is, I am ready to preach the gospel to you that are at Rome also.

For I am not ashamed of **the gospel of Christ**: for it **is the power of God unto salvation** to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek.

28. What does the Holy Spirit do when we tell men about sin, judgment and the righteousness Jesus offers us in His exchange?

John 16:8

And when He [the Holy Spirit] is come, **He will reprove [convince] the world of sin, and of righteousness, and of judgment:**

29. What three activities were the responsibilities of the servants in this parable?

Matthew 22:9-10

Go ye therefore into the highways, and as many as ye shall **find, bid** to the marriage. So those servants **went** out into the highways, and **gathered** together all as many as they **found**, both bad and good: and the wedding was furnished with guests.

God has not called us to be “salesmen” with the responsibility to convince men to “buy” our **religion**. We are ambassadors introducing men to Christ and urgently inviting them to accept His exchange. The Gospel itself is powerful. When we give the clear Gospel message, the Holy Spirit promises to do the convincing for us. Our only responsibility is to **go, find** people who will listen, and **invite** them to *come and see* Jesus for themselves. When they see Him like you see Him, they will want the same **relationship** with Him that you have.

30. In Mark 4:1-20 Christ compared giving out the Word of God to sowing seed. What principles of sowing are found in the following passages?

Psalms 126:6

They that **sow in tears** shall **reap in joy**. He that goes forth and weeps, bearing precious seed, shall **doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him.**

II Corinthians 9:6 But this I say, He which **sows sparingly** shall **reap** also **sparingly**; and he which **sows bountifully** shall **reap** also **bountifully**.

Galatians 6:9 And let us not be weary in well doing; for in due season **we shall reap, if we faint not.**

God wants us to approach soul-winning with the expectation of “reaping” a ready harvest. If we don’t find a harvest, our response is to plant the seed or water where someone else has already planted. Our job is not to produce the fruit; God gives the increase. Our job is to faithfully work in God’s fields and constantly look for “ripe fruit” to reap.

God is Holy and cannot tolerate our sin.

Romans 3:23 For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God.

God is Just and cannot overlook our sin.

Romans 6:23a The wages of sin is death.

God is Loving and has reached out to us. He has provided a way for us to be close to Him that satisfies His holy/just nature.

1 Peter 3:18 For Christ also hath once suffered for sins, the Just for the unjust, that He might bring us to God.

God is Gracious and offers salvation as a gift.

John 1:12 But as many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His name.

1 Samuel records the story of Hannah. She was heartbroken because she couldn't have children. She was so burdened about her situation that she went to the temple and begged the Lord for a son. Hannah's prayer had three ingredients.

Hannah knew **something was wrong**.

Hannah knew **normal activities would not solve** the problem.

Hannah appealed to the Throne of Grace to do what only God could do.

In 1853 Andrew Bonar wrote, "God likes to see His people shut up to this - that there is no hope but in prayer. Herein lies the church's power against the world." Would you be willing to pray "the Hannah Prayer" that God would give you a soul to lead to Christ?
