Not the evidence of his narrow intolerance. Not a contradiction to Christian love. These are God's words, as much as any words of God in the entire Bible. They are as authoritative and inflexible as the Ten Commandments. They are as much an evidence of love as John 3:16. They are as sacred as Christ's dying words on the Cross. It was God's love for the world that sent His Son into the world to save sinners. It was the Son's love for His Church that moved Him to give Himself for her on the Cross. And it is the Holy Spirit's love for the Father and for the Son and for the Church that moves Him to breathe out this fearful curse upon all who pervert the glorious and gracious good news of what was done to save poor sinners from transgression and guilt and defilement and condemnation and damnation forever in Hell.)

His commentary on it, originally written entirely in Latin, would require some 1500 pages of English translation in a volume of ordinary size. Of all his published works, and the set runs to over volumes, he thought of this as one of the few really worthy of republishing. He said to a friend, If I had my way about it they would republish only those of my books which have doctrine.
